Freak Cars Included As compared with the present schedule the minimum weight is raised from 1600 to 1700 pounds so that it will cover certain freak types of small cars slightly heavier than the ordinary Ford.

Personal Desires of Chief **Executive Represented by** Measures Now Before the State Legislature.

RELATION OF BILLS IS INCONSISTENT

Pen Declared To Be Visionary

The state penilentiary is back n politics, and after the public has been led by the executive offices to believe that, freed from political influences, the state prison is on the high road of efficiency. Personal desires of Governor Olcott are represented by two measures brought before the present legislature that are inconsistent in their relation to each other, though they will serve the

purpose of the governor. The history of the prison shows that politics has always been an Oregon boot that fettered efficient management whenever political nfluence has hovered over that institution. With the appointment of Dr. R. E. L. Steiner as temporary warden of the prison, and the later appointment of Lieutenant Louis Compton, Governor Olcott caused word to go out that the warden would be unhampered in his management. Steiner was capable and Compton is recognized as having made good in a position where the state needs one of its best officials. But I now looks as if the governor is again going to lock on the irons.
