HOFF MEASURES MADE STATUTES

Bond Commission, Created By Legislature, Urged By State Treasurer

Recommendations of O. P. Hoff, state treasurer, were closely carried out by the recent legislature when it provided for a state bond commission through passage of senate bill No. 204, introduced by Senators Ryan and Edwards. Mr. Hoff's suggestions were followed in every particular, with the exception that a member of the industrial accident commission is to be of the new commission instead of the superintendent of banks, as suggested by the state treasurer.

"It is my recommendation that there be constituted a commission known as the state bond commission consisting of the governor, the superintendent of banks and state treasurer, and that such commission be vested with authority to make all bond purchases for state accounts." Mr. Hoff said in his biennial report.

Following this recommendation Senator Joseph introduced senate bill No. 58 which provided for a commission as Mr. Hoff suggested, but which was kept in Senator Ryan's committee until the close of the session, while bill No. 204 was favorably reported out of Senator Ryan's committee, and after being much amended so that it would conform to the state treasurer's recommendations, passed both houses.
