374, by Clatsop county delegation—Relating to salaries of officials in Clatsop county.

375, by Bennett—Relating to condemnation of lands for logging, railroads, roads and ways for removal of timber.

376, by committee on agriculture—To eliminate noxious weeds.

377, by Hindman—Relating to certification of teachers on graduation from standard colleges.

378, by joint committee on ways and means—Appropriating money for medical department of University of Oregon.

379, by joint ways and means committee—Appropriating money for expenses of legislature.

380, by joint committee on roads and highway—Authorizing sale of short term bonds by highway commission.

381, by Leonard—Regulating mining on lands.

382, by Beals—Making a tax or assessment a personal debt of owners of lands and prohibiting removal of timber until all taxes are paid.

383, by Sheldon—Relating to exercise or right of eminent domain by the state highway commission.

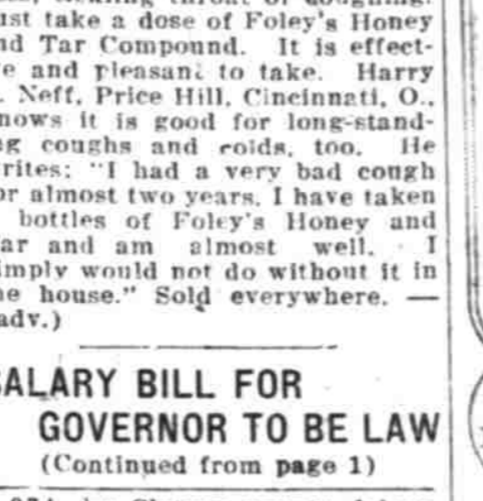
