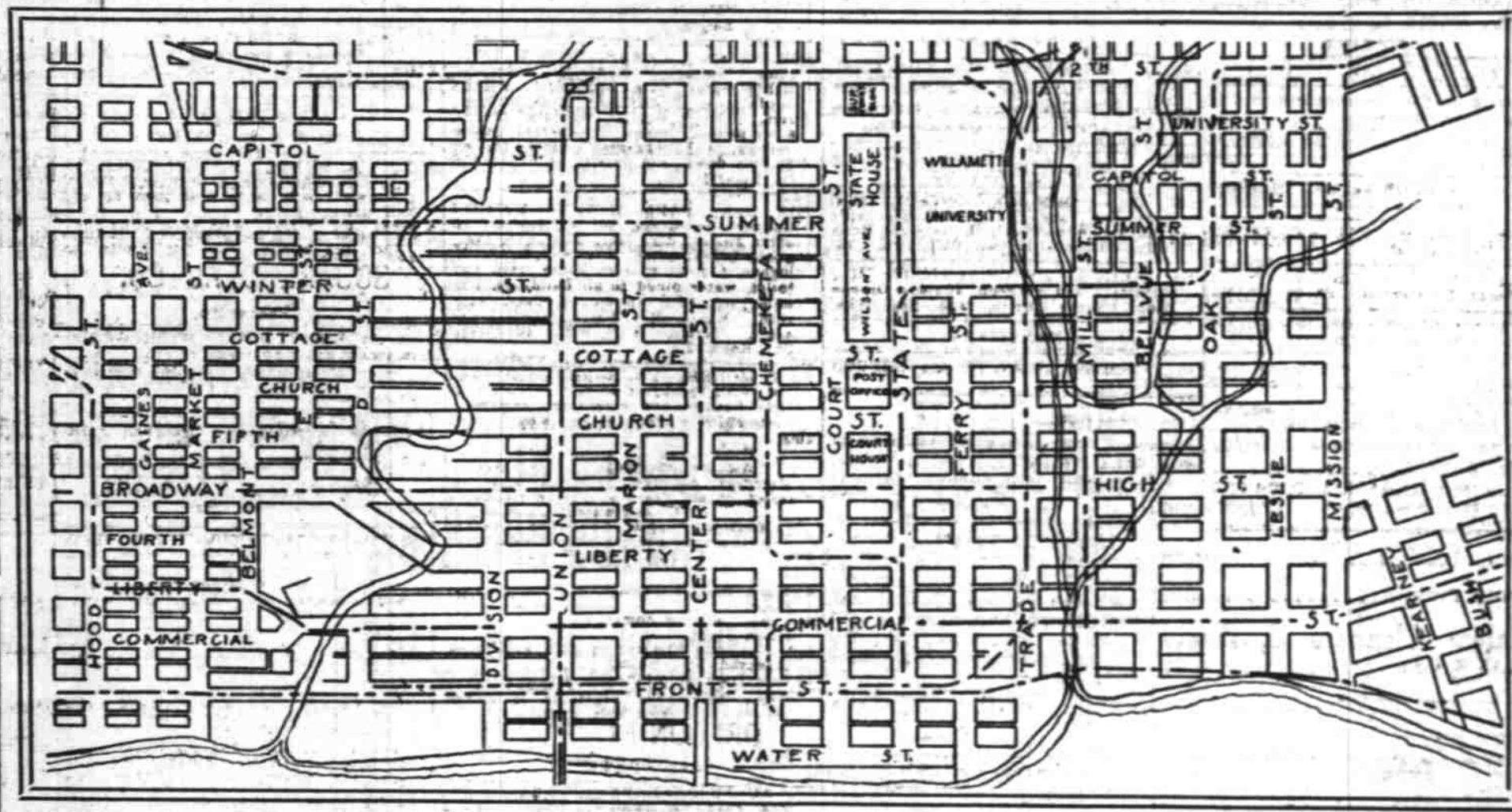

CITY CO-OPERATIVE CREAMERY

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With the announcement of five more vetoes and the signing of 13 more house and senate bills, Governor Olcott yesterday finished the task of passing on bills left with him by the 31st assembly of the state legislature which adjourned last Wednesday. The bills vetoed yesterday were:

S. B. 319, Committee on Judiciary—Providing an additional judge for the 10th judicial district, comprising the counties of Union and Wallowa.

S. B. 367, Committee on Judiciary—Providing that Clatsop county officers close their offices at 12 o'clock noon on Saturdays.

S. B. 235, Upton—Providing for the appointment of a commissioner for the co-operative marketing of meats.

S. B. 319, Committee on Judiciary—Providing an additional judge for the 10th judicial district, comprising the counties of Union and Wallowa.

S. B. 267, Committee on Judiciary—Providing that Clatsop county officers close their offices at 12 o'clock noon on Saturdays.

S. B. 235, Upton—Providing for the appointment of a commissioner for the co-operative marketing of meats.

S. B. 258, Ellis—Relating to salaries in Harney county.

H. B. 490, Fletcher and Powell—Relating to salary of district attorney in Polk county.

In his veto message on Senate Bill 319 the governor objects mainly to the provision that the additional judge must be selected permanently from Wallowa county, but further, "the governor says, but investigation he finds there is not enough congestion of court business to warrant the creation of a new judge."

The executive's reason for vetoing senate bill No. 367, requiring the closing of county offices on Saturdays is virtually the same as that which caused him to veto a similar bill for Multnomah county. He believes the custom would work a hardship on the public, particularly at the tax paying season.

Measure Held Inadequate
Relative to Senator Upton's bill No. 235, which is announced today as vetoed, the governor says:

"This bill provides for a commissioner whose duty it would be to investigate the stock condition for the purpose of gathering information in regard thereto. Expenses and salary of the commissioner would be paid out of a fund derived from fees imposed on livestock shipments. The bill itself provides that its purpose is to co-ordinate the investigation and profiteer between the grower and consumer can be eliminated."
