Mr. Goe came to Canada when 19 years of age and located in Winnipeg, which is still his home. He has appeared as accompanist for many of the big artists of this country, including Anna Fitis, Carolina Lazarus, Emma Roberts, Lucile Stevenson, Lucy Gates, Greeta Masson, Charles W. Clark, David Bispham, Arthur Middleton, Lambert Murphy, Richard Czerwony, Louis Persinger, Cornelius Van Vliet, Craig Campbell, and others. Mr. Goe has often appeared on the American concert platform, and last season made a three-week tour with Lucy Gates through Montana, Dakota and Minnesota. He was for some years organist at St. Stephens church in Winnipeg, of which the well-known novelist "Ralph Connor" (Dr. C. W. Gordon) is pastor. He is now organist of Augustine church in this city."
