**JAMES ELVIN LEAVES
FOR CHATAUQUA POST**
(Continued from page 1)

as during the year just past.

Young Men Reached.

John Farrar stated that while
Mr. Elvin had accomplished won-
der in a financial way, what he
liked about his work particularly
was that he brought boys and
young men into the building to
a greater extent than ever before,
to participate in the benefits and
enjoy the religious atmosphere.

The secretary of the board,
Curtis Cross, was instructed to
prepare a resolution embodying
the feelings of the board toward
Mr. Elvin and its appreciation of
his efficient services, and those
of his wife, who has been such an
important factor in carrying on
the important work of the associa-
tion, especially in the social de-
partment.

During the past winter Mr. El-
vin has filled the pulpit of the
Presbyterian church regularly for
several months while that con-
gregation was without a regular
pastor, and members of that
church are loud in their praises
of Rev. Mr. Elvin and his work
there.

Former Pastorate Held Here.
Before the war Mr. Elvin was
for several years pastor of the
First Congregational church of
Salem, and was very popular with
his congregation. It was during
that pastorate that he established
moving pictures as a feature of
the Sunday evening worship, and
attracted such crowds to his
church that the commodious build-
ing was not of sufficient capacity
to accommodate the crowds.

During this time Mr. Elvin was
also a member of the state parole
board, and was active in his work
in behalf of convicts and men who
had been paroled. Upon leaving
for the war he resigned this po-
sition and was assured by Gov-
nor Withycombe of his reappoint-
ment upon his return. He came
home, however, to find that the
governor had passed away, and
that his successor, Governor Ol-
cott, was in the midst of his job
of setting rid of every Withy-
combe appointee, so of course Mr.
Elvin, like many others, was not
reappointed, the state and the
penitentiary thereby losing in-
valuable service.

Service Under Fire.
Mr. Elvin went into W. M. C.
A. work at the outbreak of the
war after vainly trying to get into
the army as chaplain, and had
some exciting experiences in
France, where he had some very
important work in charge of a
large area and was for a time on
duty in the front line trenches,
under constant fire of the Ger-
mans. He was sent home in the
summer of 1918 to assist in rais-
ing the budget required for war
work, and immediately on its
completion went to Europe for
the second time and remained
there until well into 1919. It
was upon his departure for Eu-
rope the second time that he ten-
dered his resignation to the Con-
gregational church and insisted
upon its being accepted, as he felt
that it was an injustice to the
church to hold the position open
to him for a longer period than
Mr. Elvin leaves Salem with

the consciousness of having per-
formed a remarkable work in

tant field with larger opportuni-
