FARM PROJECTS ARE PURCHASED

State Land Settlement Commission Continues Experiments In Oregon

Aside from the 60-acre model farm project near Independence, the state land settlement commission has acquired farm tracts at Roseburg and Prineville and is planning to acquire others at Ontario and Coos Bay, according to Whitney L. Boies, of Portland, chairman of the commission, who was here yesterday in conference with Governor Olcott.

The independence project has been in successful operation for more than a year. The Roseburg tract of 51 acres is nearly complete, with only painting and minor details remain. The Prineville farm is a 60-acre project in the Ochoco irrigation district, and the Ontario project, if developed, also will be an irrigated farm.

The commission plans to acquire about 35 acres on Coos Bay. The commission has been waiting to ascertain the degree of success it would attain in the development of model farms before asking the legislature for more money, and no appropriation was asked at the session which closed in February.
