Fourteen negroes were shot in a race riot which broke out in Springfield, Ohio. The disorder directly followed the shooting of a policeman by a negro whom he was searching for firearms—but it was initiated by assault by a negro on a white girl six days previous to the shooting. Four companies of Ohio National Guard and 150 special policemen, supplemented by several machine guns, were used to quell the disturbance. The city is now being patrolled by police and firemen.
