CHILDREN LOSE HOFFMAN CASE
Youthful Widower of Aged Woman Wins and Action May be Appealed

That it was through undue influence and threats on the part of her youthful husband, that Margaret V. Hoffman, aged 72, who died January 3, 1921, failed to make provision for her four children, in a will dated December 25, 1920, were causes furnished as grounds for contesting the will in the county court this week. The children failed to furnish sufficient evidence to secure a verdict in their favor yesterday, but it is thought the case will be appealed to a higher court.

According to the complaint the real and personal property is valued at \$6,000, and the four daughters, Alma Anderson, Ellen Butts, Pearl Martin and Nora March, and Joseph R. Hoffman are the heirs of the estate. It further states that at the time of the execution of the will and for some time prior the mother was acting under the influence of the step-father and that through fear, misrepresentation and fraud she was induced to make the will.

Joseph R. Hoffman, husband of the deceased, was alleged to be 39 years old at the time of the marriage to the woman of 70, and it appeared from the evidence that the two years of married life were spent by Hoffman with the purpose of reaping the benefits derived from the estate.
