Thrips Numerous—

Thrips, a tiny insect destructive to the germ life of the fruit blossom, is to be found in many places in Marion county. S. H. Van Trump, county horticultural inspector, states that they are to be found doing serious damage in certain localities throughout the county. A sample twig of a prune tree in blossom was brought in yesterday from this side of the Cottage farm, and was found to be infested with the little pest, though not in sufficient numbers to destroy the crop. Fruit growers are using the spray to rid their trees of the insect.

BASEBALL PENNANT CHASE STARTED

National and American League Teams Begin Favorable Season

Sixteen teams of the National and American baseball leagues today begin their annual pennant chase. Favorable weather is predicted.

With the various teams now strengthened and the shifting of players to new scenes of activity, officials and followers of the sport are confident that close struggles will feature the season.

Today's contests are confined to east vs. east, and west vs. west games. In the National league Brooklyn faces Boston at Boston; New York opens at Philadelphia; Pittsburgh opposes Cincinnati on the Reds' grounds and St. Louis meets the Cubs at Chicago.

In the American circuit Philadelphia faces the Yankees at New York; Boston plays Washington at Washington; Chicago tackles Detroit at Detroit, while the Cleveland world champions play in the park of the St. Louis Browns.

The visiting clubs in turn will formally open their home season within the next week.

CITIZENS LATE TO OFFER CARS

Cherrians Are Appealed To For Better Cooperation On Blossom Day

LIBERTY IS GENEROUS

Daily Visitations to Tourist Camping Ground Plan of Organization

Only 80 owners of automobiles have so far offered the services of their cars for next Sunday, Blossom day, to the Cherrians, according to Paul Stege, who last night made another plea to the members of that organization at their regular monthly dinner at the Commercial club. Mr. Stege, and the committee working with him, have estimated that not less than twice that number will accommodate the number of tourists who will arrive by train.

Some of the cars already offered are from residents of the Liberty district who have expressed themselves as desiring to help boost the movement. The Liberty band has also offered to play on that day and when the tourists pass through Liberty on the road south of Salem the band will entertain them.

Macy Captains Police.

Bert Macy was last night instructed to select men to stand on street corners in the city and direct the tourists on the roads which lead out of town. He is also to appoint committees of men to meet every train during the day as late as 4 o'clock in the afternoon. The Cherrians will wear their uniforms and will easily be discernible from the rest of the crowd. W. M. Hamilton, assisted by Carl Gabrielson, captain of the Cherrian drill team, will be on duty at the Commercial club that day to take charge of the cars that report there for duty.

Other business men who talked to the Cherrians last night were T. E. McCroskey and J. J. Roberts, members of the city park board. Mr. Roberts asked the Cherrians to visit the automobile camp grounds this season and make the tourists feel welcome. Arrangements are being made to have some members present every night during the season.

Motion Pictures Probable.

Mr. McCroskey spoke of the efforts of the Commercial club to get the motion picture company to take pictures on Blossom day and outlined the route which has been selected. The route through the prune district leads south to Rosedale and past the Friends church to the Jefferson road. The cherry section follows the Oak Grove road to a point one mile this side of the Popcorn schoolhouse and includes a stop at the Dibble & Franklin bulb farm west of Salem.

Mr. McCroskey urged that the Cherrians in their travels through the rural districts of the county to get in touch with the farmers. He announced that shortly 150 signs indicating directions will be placed along the roadways of the county. One large sign will be placed at Aurora, the northern entrance to the county, announcing the entrance to the county, and the distance to each important place in the county. A similar one will be erected at Jefferson, the southern entrance.

Hal D. Patton, who has recently returned from a trip through California and over the border into Mexico, reported to the organization some of his observations which he made in his study of police and fire department methods while on his trip. Mr. Patton secured entrance into Mexico without paying the \$10 passport fee only upon presentation of a letter from City Recorder Earl Race, vouching for Mr. Patton as an honored member of the city council of Salem, Or. He included in his talk some of his adventures in Tia Juana and Hollywood.

Albert Gille sang as part of the program, the entire membership joining with him in the encore.

HEAVY PROGRAM IS COMING UP

State Highway Commission To Let List of Contracts Next Meeting

At a meeting in Portland April 22, the state highway commission will open bids on the following projects:

Douglas county: Pacific highway, Myrtle Creek-Canyonville section, 2.5 miles of crushed gravel surfacing involving 23,000 cubic yards of crushed gravel surfacing.

Gilliam county: John Day River highway, Mayville-Thirtymile Creek section, 6.9 miles of broken stone surfacing involving 11,500 cubic yards of broken stone surfacing.

Josephine county: Pacific highway, Grants Pass-Jackson county line section, 3.8 miles of roadbed widening involving 13,000 cubic yards of excavation.

Clatsop county: Oregon-Washington highway, Morgan-Lexington section, 12.65 miles of surfacing involving 29,000 cubic yards of surfacing.

Union county: Old Oregon trail, Hot Lake-Union section, 5.93 miles of grading and gravel surfacing involving 75,000 cubic yards of excavation and 10,500 cubic yards of gravel surfacing.

Old Oregon trail, Union-Telocast section, 6.01 miles of surfacing involving 13,000 cubic yards of surfacing.

Old Oregon trail, Telocast-North Powder section, 9.1 miles of surfacing involving 21,500 cubic yards of surfacing.

Wallowa county: La Grande-Joseph highway, Enterprise-Joseph section, 6.23 miles of grading and surfacing involving 30,000 cubic yards of excavation and 14,000 cubic yards of surfacing.

Wasco county: Columbia river highway, Mosier-The Dalles section, 12.5 miles of paving.

Yamhill county: West side highway, McMinnville-Amity section, 5.25 miles of grading involving 30,000 cubic yards of excavation.

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
