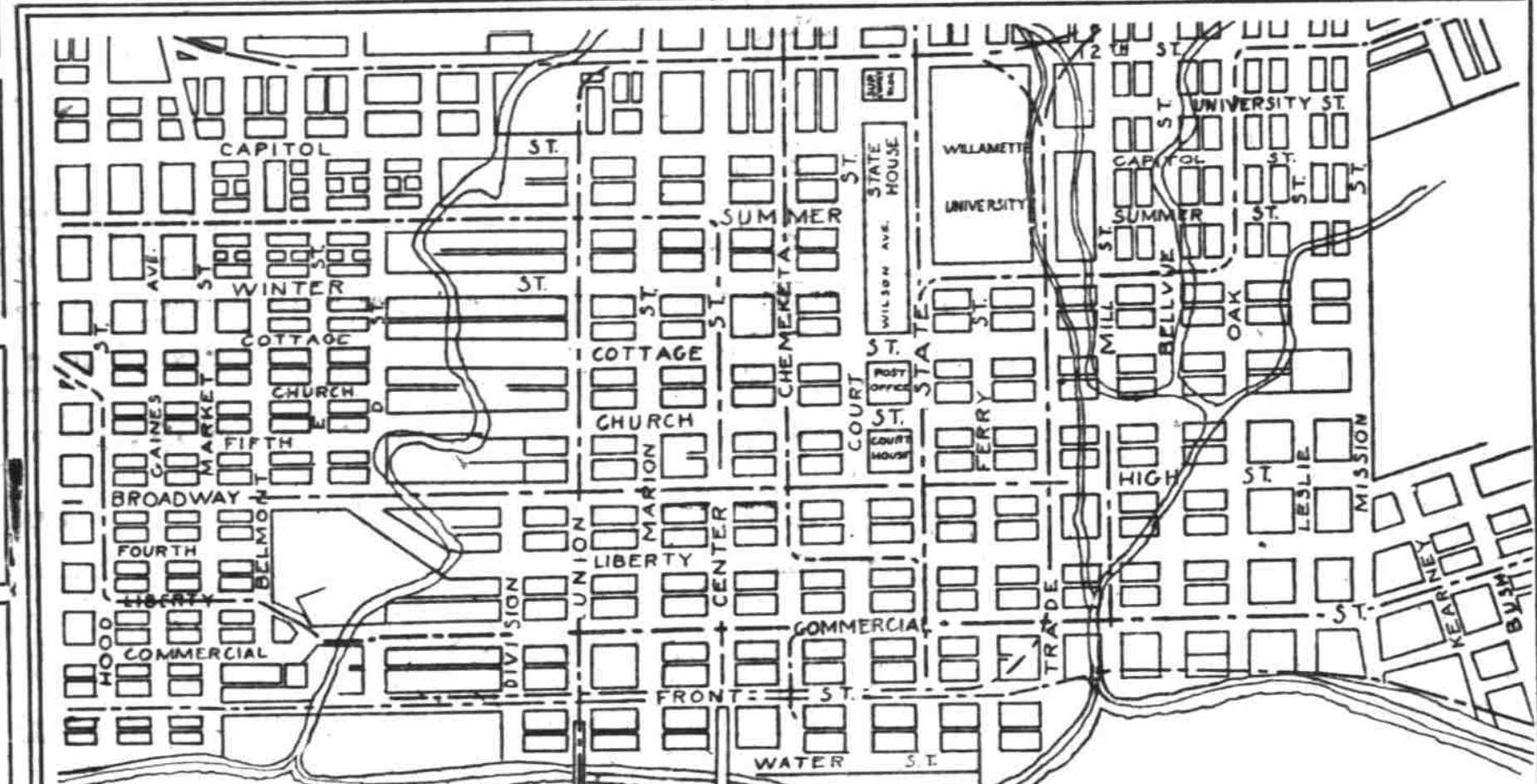

COUNTIES MUST STAND EXPENSE

Law Interpreted to Referred Measures in Municipalities

Under chapter 79, laws of 1921, which was senate bill 74, providing for organization of the port of Portland commission, and which is referred to the voters of the port district at the special election of June 7, the question has arisen in Multnomah county whether the county or the state pays for the voters' pamphlet covering the measure.

Attorney General Van Winkle has advised the secretary of state's office orally that under chapter 82, laws of 1921, which was senate bill 133, it will be up to Multnomah county to pay the expense of publishing and distributing the official literature on the measure although the port district does not cover the whole county.

Chapter 82 amends section 4111 Oregon laws, and provides that the county clerk shall be substituted for the secretary of state, the district attorney for the attorney general and the county judge for the governor when the legislature refers to the people of the subdivision affected any measure relating only to any county, district, port or municipal corporation other than a city or town. The amendment continues the provision of the old law that the state officials shall act when a referred measure affects more than one county, and in such cases the state bears the expense of the pamphlet. Logically it is held that under the amendment the county should bear the expense if the measure affects the entire county or any smaller subdivision.

The suggestion has been made that to save expense Multnomah county might have the measure printed for distribution and make it an insert in the general pamphlets printed by the state. The difficulty with this, however, is that there is no way by which the secretary of state in mailing the pamphlets could segregate the people of the port district from the general body of voters in Multnomah county.

The period for the presentation of arguments for or against any measure expired March 28, hence all that can now be printed officially relative to the port measure is the bill itself.

In a similar position are Umatilla, Wasco and Union counties, where salary measures are to be voted on by the people and also in Wasco county where the question of increasing the salary of the justice of the peace at The Dalles is up.

"The way to run this country," said Knowlton, "is to put thoroughly wise, capable, alert and honest men in control of affairs."

SPEECH MEETS GENERAL FAVOR

Republican Senate Leaders Approve Harding's Policy

LODGE MUCH PLEASSED

Definite Stand Taken By President Not A Surprise To Legislators

WASHINGTON, April 12.—General approval of President Harding's declarations to congress today that the United States could have no part in the present league of nations and that the state of war should be ended by congressional resolution, was expressed by Republican senate leaders, both of the "irreconcilable" and "reservationist" groups.

Senator Lodge, republican leader, who led the long fight for reservations to the peace treaty, said he was "extremely pleased" by the message, which he declared "separates us from the league and approves passage of the Knox resolution."

Senators Johnson of California and Borah of Idaho, leaders of the "irreconcilables," expressed gratification at the president's declarations. They expressed doubt, however, that the peace treaty with the league covenant excluded could be put into shape for ratification.

Senator Hitchcock, of Nebraska, acting democratic leader, expressed disappointment at the president's message.

"What the president said about the league suited me," was the comment of Senator Reed of Missouri, a democrat, "irreconcilable."

Early Ratification Improbable
Senator Kellogg, of Minnesota, a republican, "mild reservationist," declared the president would "be able to work out an association of nations and a peace program that will be satisfactory to all."

Mr. Harding's definite stand against the covenant was not a surprise to republican leaders of the senate, although the exact wording was unknown until shortly before the executive left for the capital. The first draft was completed soon after midnight, and when proof sheets came this morning the president called the cabinet meeting and summoned republican members of the foreign relations committee.

At this conference, the president considered the advice of mild reservationist and irreconcilables. Without exception senators present expressed afterward their satisfaction with the president's views, though there was a divergence of views regarding the likelihood of an early ratification of the treaty with the league and other portions omitted.

It was pointed out that the treaty was not now before the senate, and that Mr. Harding had shown no indication that he meant to re-submit it in the near future. In his address he did not specifically declare his intention to do so, merely saying that in reference to separate treaties with Germany and Austria, "the wiser course would seem to be the acceptance of the confirmation of our rights and interests as already provided, and to engage under the existing treaty, assuming, of course, this can be satisfactorily accomplished by . . . explicit reservations."
