

# CITY NEWS IN BRIEF

**Complaint Withdrawn**—W. R. Smyth of Portland, was among the arrests made in the city April 9, on a charge of cutting corners at the intersection of Court and High streets. He appeared before Judge Race, pleaded guilty and was fined \$10. Not having sufficient money with him he was permitted to pay his fine a check made out to a Portland bank, made out to Chief of Police Moffitt, who endorsed it and had it cashed. The check was returned for lack of funds, whereupon Mr. Moffitt filed a complaint against Smyth and Thursday went to Portland where he secured his arrest. However, Smyth was able to convince Mr. Moffitt that it was due to a misunderstanding that the check was returned and the complaint was withdrawn last night from the justice court.
