BIDS FOR HAULING GRAVEL ARE LET
L. R. Tweedie and E. G. Williams Get Contracts For Road Work
At 1 o'clock yesterday the county court opened bids for the hauling of gravel for the Marion county roads. A bid for 10,000 yards of gravel for the Staton district was let to L. R. Tweedie whose bid for hauls will average about \$1.06. Other bids submitted for this work were made by Bailey and Ramtoz Transfer company, Staton; Crabtree Brothers, Staton; A. W. Shiedel, Aurora; Kenneth Paomson Truck company, Portland; George Christensen, Salem; H. J. Milson, Salem; C. E. Taylor, Staton; Bishop & Grimm, Aurora; A. R. Alexander, Portland; E. D. Olds & Son, Oak Grove; E. A. Palmer, McMinnville; Stout & Stout, McMinnville; G. G. Williams, Mt. Angel, received the contract for 1000 yards of gravel to be used on the Mt. Angel roads. His bid averaged about \$1.09 a yard and will include hauls of from one to eight and one-half miles.
