

# DODSON SPEAKS AT CLUB LUNCH

Portland Chamber Manager Tells Things Needed to Make State Better

Rapid strides that have been made by Portland in developing as a seaport and the scarcely scratched resources of the Willamette valley and Oregon in general, including the iron possibilities along the Columbia river west of Portland, combined into a theme that made the talk of W. D. B. Dodson, manager of the Portland Chamber of Commerce, before the Salem Commercial club has been heard here for some

Mr. Dodson that a few years ago Portland was one of the most disconsolate places in the world because of the dropping off in shipping. In the next ten years he predicted that Portland will grow more rapidly as a seaport

than any other city on the Pacific Through the active work of its

citizens and the Portland chamber, Mr. Dodson showed that now the city has operating from its harbor 11 lines of steamships through the Panama canal, five to Europe, three to the orient and others along the Pacific coast. He showed that this had been made possible because of the great country back of the city.
