Frank Heam, celebrated western artist, whose death occurred in California last month numbere. large coterie of admirers of his work in Salem, but there are not so many who know, however, ot his early life in Oregon. It is not generally known for instance, that his father, Lucien Heath was the first secretary of state in Oregon. A native of Michigan, the latter came to Oregon in the 50's, settling first in Polk county, where he took an active interest in public affairs, and was elected county clerk at the general election of officers for the new state in 1858. Mr. Heath was the successful candidate of the Democratic party for secretary of state.

After serving one term he engaged in the mercantile business in Salem. It is interesting to know that during the time he was secretary of state he was also mayor of Salem. Later he removed to California and engaged

in business at Santa Cruz. Frank Heath, as a young boy, developed talent as an artist, later studying under the best instructors in San Francisco and New York. He became an asso ciate and close friend of Keith Yelland and the California artists of that day.


