On February 21, 1921, 28 citles within the state reported deposits in excess of \$1,000,000. The same number within this class was reported on April 28, 1921 Fifty-one cities were reported in February having deposits in excess of \$500,000 and 50 cities within the same class were re ported in April. A total of 123 other cities and towns, representing 136 banks, reported deposits aggregating \$22,052,109.40.

"It is very pleasing," said Mr Bramwell, "to observe that bank, located in those portions of Oregon which have suffered the greatest hardships resulting from the decline of agricultural and livestock products have shown a substantial improvement. While the recent reports of the banks in Oregon showed a general decline in demand deposits, this was to be expected and readjustments were provided to meet the unusual conditions.
