Club Constitutions Are Given to School Board

All of the clubs and societies of the high school have submitted their constitutions to the school board, according to an announcement made yesterday by Superintendent George Hug. The board, however, has not given time to their consideration because of other more pressing business.

The action has been taken in compliance with an order of the school board some time ago because of agitation against so-called secret societies following some rather strenuous initiation ceremonies. The board asked for the constitution of the clubs as a basis to determine whether the clubs are legally constituted.

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
