Stimulation of Local Consumption Advocated By California Man

"Get the other fellow interested in your game, and you'll have profit," is the sentiment expressed by a California visitor who appeared before the Rotary club Wednesday, to tell how they made a strawberry market down in his home town.

The canner were not getting into the game worth a cent. They were considerably less than dead ones, and wouldn't touch a strawberry even by telephone. The growers had a big crop on hand, and they couldn't ship or eat it, or sell to the packers.

"Sell 'em to the townspeople"

proposed one man. "Make everybody buy and eat strawberries. We'll sell 'em so cheap it's money in their pockets and a good taste in their mouth—and we'll move our crop instead of leaving it to rot on the ground."

They organized an "Eat a box today" club; they sang and whistled strawberry tunes in the streets, they bombarded the hotels and the restaurants with strawberries, and made strawberry shortcake the national dish. The townspeople took it up in earnest; everybody bought strawberries to eat fresh to eat, to preserve. They took practically every pound of fruit that was grown in the neighborhood that usually sent out an enormous quantity for other people to eat. The growers put the prices down so that it was profitable as well as pleasant to eat strawberries to replenish—and everybody is happier than they have been since they were courting and went to the big picnic.

This is the essence of experience of one California town that tried it.

HARDING TALKS TO NAVY GRADS

President Presents Diplomas To 260 Graduates of Annapolis Academy

DENBY CHIEF SPEAKER

Battery Booms 21-Gun Salute as Executive is Driven Into Grounds

ANNAPOLIS, Md., June 2.—President Harding presented diplomas to the naval academy graduating class today with a prayer that the newly commissioned officers never would be called into battle, but with an admonition that willingness to fight and die for one's country always must remain one of the most potent safeguards to civilization.

Speaking in Baltimore hall before the midshipmen and thousands of their relatives and friends, the president reaffirmed his faith in a strong and fearless republic, but added that he wanted it always a republic of "high ideals."

The most desired of national attainments, he said, would be a medium between the spirit of maintained institutions and the crusader.

Would Avoid War

Mr. Harding promised that so long as he remained president, no American would be called upon to fire a gun except in a case in harmony with the American conscience and for which answer could be made to God.

The president's short address was delivered after he had addressed each of the 260 graduates his diploma and congratulated each. Previously Secretary Denby had made the commencement address, advising the graduates that their best assets as officers would be the respect and love of their men and counseling them to be true "officers and gentlemen," and never "snobs."

Lumber Production is 30 Percent Under Normal

For the week ending May 28, 112 mills in western Oregon and western Washington report production at 26,591,246 feet which is 30 per cent below normal.

New business totalled 61,328,838 feet.

Shipments totalled 57,809,639 feet.

For delivery by rail, new business included 1,599 cars; rail shipments 1,511 cars. Unshipped balance in the rail trade was 3,767 cars.

Local business totalled 3,222,629 feet.

In the cargo trade, domestic orders totalled 6,777,452 feet; export, 3,598,747 feet. Coastwise and intercoastal cargo shipments totalled 474,000 feet; export shipments, 2,774,000 feet.

TITLE LOOMS FOR HI NINE

Salem Baseball Team Defeats Columbia of Portland in Fine Contest.

GAME HERE SATURDAY

If Locals Win Second Time Claim to State Supremacy Will be Clear

Playing an air-tight game of baseball, the Salem high school team yesterday brought the team of Columbia university into camp to the tune of 7 to 4 in the first of the two championship games to be played with the Portland school. Coach "Tubby" Hendricks last night reported that the Salem men had played their finest game of the season, making but one error in the nine innings. The game was played in Portland.

Ashby Masters Situation.

Ashby, regular red and black mound master, defended his position throughout the entire game and was hit but four times. Fans who saw the game say that it was perfect baseball, with the Salem team securing 7 hits for their 7 points, and Columbia 4 hits for their 4 points.

Stockton, the Columbia catcher and all-star athlete, played the best game for the Portland team. Coach Hendricks said that it was impossible to give most credit to any particular man on the Salem nine, but that Ashby had done very creditable work on the mound and Caughill had done better than any other time this season behind the bat.

Columbia Beats Colleges.

Columbia has a remarkable record this year, having defeated five regular college teams. They will meet the local men again Saturday at Oxford park, and if Salem wins here they will have almost a clear title to the state championship. While it was greatly desired that they should play on Willamette field in order to play at the same time as the track meet, it was held to be impossible because of the roughness of the Bearcat field.

Rinehart Has Accident.

Salem used the regular line-up: Ashby, p; Adolph, 1b; Brown, 2b; Moon, 3b; Armstrong, ss; F. Rinehart, lf; Morman, cf; R. Rinehart, rf. Max Jones went in for R. Rinehart after the regular right fielder had turned his ankle and was forced out of the game. He accredited himself well during the game and made a clever steal from second to third and then from third home.

Coach Hendricks said last night that he could not be certain of the game Saturday, but that the Salem men played better yesterday than ever before, and he could not tell whether they could repeat their playing on Saturday.

BELLINGER TO HOLD CLINIC

Hospital Superintendent Invited to Appear at Corvallis Soon

Dr. G. C. Bellinger, superintendent of the State Tuberculosis hospital, has been invited to conduct a free tuberculosis clinic at Corvallis the latter part of June, upon completion of a special survey being made of conditions in Benton county by the Oregon Tuberculosis association and the state board of health.

The clinic will be the third held in the state this year by the state association, which is supported by the sale of Christmas seals. Examinations are given to those who have had contact with tuberculosis patients, or who may

suspect the presence of the disease because of physical conditions. Patients are referred to the clinic by doctors and health workers and may come in response to publicity. The clinics have been of value to physicians, patients and laymen generally, because of the educational features connected with them.

Robert W. Osborn, field executive for the Oregon Tuberculosis association, who is conducting the Benton survey and clinic, was in Salem yesterday.
