

ALBANY WINS IN WILD GAME

It Takes Eleven Innings To Decide After Motley Class Of Playing

HITTING IS FREQUENT

Berg Touched Up For Fourteen Safes and Albany Boys for Ten

Sunday's game between Salem and Albany was a heartbreaker, particularly for Salem. The score was 10 to 8, and it took 11 innings. The game was marked by hard and frequent hitting, some costly errors on both sides, and withal some playing that was as good as has been seen on the local diamond this season. The crowd was the largest of the season.

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WORLD CHAMP IS UNBEATEN

Benny Leonard Successfully Defends Title Against Rocky Kansas

DECISION UNANNOUNCED

Majority of Experts Hold Challenger is Bested by Title Holder

HARRISON, N. J., June 6.—Benny Leonard defended his title of lightweight champion of the world in a 12-round bout here tonight at the Newark baseball park, his opponent being Rocky Kansas of Buffalo.

Under the New Jersey law, no decision by the referee is allowed, but in the opinion of the majority of the experts around the ring-side, Leonard cleverly outpointed his opponent.

Just before the principals entered the ring, it was announced that they had weighed in at 9:10 o'clock. Leonard weighed 136 and Kansas 134.

Danny Sullivan of Jersey City was announced as the referee. Kansas entered the ring at 11 o'clock and Leonard three minutes later.

Fighters Start in Clinch. Round 1.—Kansas led left and missed. He led again and was neatly blocked by Leonard. Kansas landed a straight left to the face. Leonard hooked a right to the jaw. Both rushed into a clinch, putting short rights to the body. Kansas landed left on body. Leonard countered left on head. Kansas swung his left high on the head. Leonard hooked right to the jaw. They were sparring at the bell.

Round 2.—Kansas missed a left for the head. Leonard hooked his right to the head. Kansas landed a right to the head and at close quarters both put short rights to the head. Leonard jabbed left three times to Kansas' face. Kansas sent his right to the body and Leonard hooked his left to the wind. They exchanged lefts to head and body. Leonard sent a hard right uppercut over the heart and kept jabbing to the face blocking cleverly. Leonard uppercut with his right to the jaw and they were sparring at the bell.

Boys Are Cautious. Round 3.—Both sparred carefully. They exchanged lefts to the stomach. Kansas landed low left to the body but apologized. Leonard hooked left to the face. Then the challenger hooked two lefts to the face and Leonard sent left to the wind. Kansas hooked a left to the neck and Leonard missed a right swing just as the bell rang.

Round 4.—Kansas forced Leonard into his own corner on the ropes and landed short arm blows to the body. They exchanged lefts to the face, and Leonard hooked his right across to the head. Kansas rushed Leonard to the ropes and landed right on the ribs, and they clinched. Kansas tried his left backhand blow and Leonard seemed displeased. The champion hooked a hard left to the face and they were in a close mixup at the bell.

Counters Are Even. Round 5.—Leonard jabbed left over heart. Kansas hooked his left to the stomach. Benny cleverly avoiding Kansas' rushes with nimble footwork. They exchanged lefts to the body. Leonard hooked his right to the head and Kansas swung his right high on the head. Each reached the body at close quarters and Leonard jabbed two lefts to the face just before the bell.

Round 6.—Leonard stepped around lively and tried to feint Kansas into a lead. They exchanged rights to the head and clinched. Leonard jabbed left to the face and Kansas hooked right to the body. Kansas reached the head hooked his right to the Leonard's corner and the latter stepped back just before the bell.

Round 7.—Kansas led left to the face but was blocked, and they fell into a clinch. Leonard landed left to the face and hooked his right to the head. Leonard then hooked his right to the head. Kansas rushed, but Leonard sidestepped him and jabbed his left

to the face. Kansas slipped to one knee, but was up in a jiffy. They exchanged lefts to the head and Kansas sent his left to the ribs and Leonard hooked his right to the head. In a fast rally Leonard jabbed his left twice to the face and his right to the head. Kansas landed his right low on Leonard's body and said he could not help it.

Round 8.—They exchanged lefts to the face and then Leonard rushed Kansas to the ropes, landing left and right on the body. Then Leonard landed a right, hook, left hook, and right uppercut. Kansas getting short lefts and rights to the body before they broke away.

Leonard Bets Opponent. Round 9.—Leonard blocked a left lead and then they clinched. Leonard jabbed left to the face. Kansas rushed Leonard to the Buffalo man's corner but when they broke away Leonard sent three left jabs to the face, rapidly and Kansas hooked his right to the body. Leonard jabbed left and crossed his right to the jaw. Leonard hooked a hard left to the stomach and dodged safely from a left swing. Leonard slipped in Kansas' corner and the latter stepped back just before the bell.

Round 10.—Kansas was aggressive but Leonard stepped away. Leonard hooked his left to the body and right to the head. Kansas forced Leonard to the ropes, landing short rights and

lefts to the head. Both missed left hooks and exchanged lefts to the head. This also was a round.

Kansas Bleeds Freely. Round 11.—Both led and missed. Then Kansas rushed Leonard sidestepped. Leonard jabbed two lefts to the face and Kansas hooked his right to the body. Leonard landed a left hook on the face. Another left hook from Leonard on Kansas' lips, and the cut bled freely. Leonard kept jabbing left to the face and they exchanged short arm blows on head and body at close quarters. There was not much damage done.

Round 12.—Kansas rushed but was blocked. Leonard met another of his rushes with a straight left to the face. Leonard tried to feint Kansas into a corner but nothing came of it, and they exchanged rights on the head. Leonard kept jabbing and Kansas went into a clinch. Both missed lefts and rights to the head and then Leonard hooked his left to the face. Leonard hooked two lefts to the stomach and Kansas was wild, missing left and right to head. Leonard then hooked his left to the mouth and Kansas his right to the side of the head. Kansas was bleeding freely from the mouth when the bell rang.


