

ED ADMITS HE IS GUILTY

Sentence to Be Imposed Saturday on Man Under Statutory Charge

C. Freed, indicted by the grand jury on a statutory charge involving a young girl, pleaded his plea of not guilty at that time, to that of guilty in the circuit court yesterday, after being arraigned before Judge R. Keily. Upon motion of Freed's attorney the court imposed sentence tomorrow at 10 o'clock.

Burton Durdall was arraigned yesterday on a charge of obtaining money under false promise. He entered a plea of guilty. His trial has been set for June 20, at 10 a. m. Dean Williams, arraigned yesterday, charged with selling intoxicating liquors, pleaded not guilty to the charge. His trial is set for June 21, at 9 a. m. James Clark, indicted by the grand jury on the same charge, was also arraigned yesterday and entered a plea of not guilty. He will be arraigned for hearing at 9 o'clock a. m. on June 22.

Frank Grimes, charged with selling intoxicating liquor, was arraigned yesterday and his plea is not guilty. He will be arraigned on a former charge of having intoxicating liquor in his possession at 1 p. m. tomorrow.
