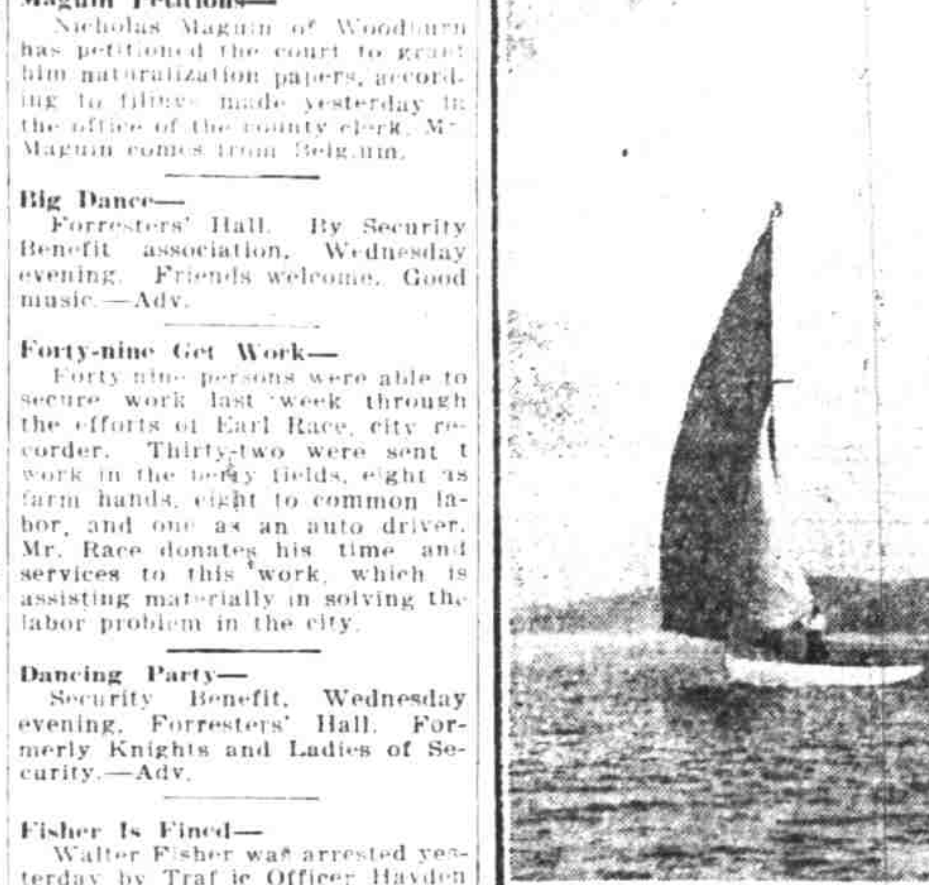

Cockran, of Bella Temple, Dallas, Tex., in its report recommended that the institution for the care of crippled children be a centralized one and located at St. Louis. A minority report by John Morrison, of Kismet Temple, Brooklyn, N. Y., objected to the central hospital plan. The Morrison report urged that one half of the fund available be distributed among hospitals already established throughout the country, and that the other half be held for disposition at the 1922 meeting. The majority report stated that the shrine had raised \$14,398 to be used for the proposed hospital. Imperial Potentate Ellis L. Garretson, of Tacoma, Wash., is opposing the central hospital plan while past Imperial Potentate W. Freehand Kenrick, of Philadelphia, is supporting the majority report. Special Order Today.
