To State Within Reguired Period

Only Small Amount of Gasoline Used for Other Than Road Driving

A number of users of motor chase, cannot recover because they are late in presenting their claims. This has reference to the first 90-day period since the law became effective March 1.

Secretary of State Kozer issued statement yesterday showing that refunds paid from March I May 31 aggregated \$2217.17.

Dealers Report.

Rebates Required. "Under the provisions of a law enacted at the last session of the legislature, a tax of 1 cent per Washington and Yamhill coun- of Oregon, must be remitted to enne for the state highway construction is in addition to the tax levied under the act of 1919 amounting to 1 cent per gallon on gasoline and other motor vehicle fuels except distillate upon which a rate of 1/2 cent per gallon was placed. No authority is given for rebating the taxes paid under the

law of 1919, for any reason, "The law of 1921 authorizes refund to be made of the taxes paid thereunder, or 1 cent per gallon on every kfnd of motor vehicle fuels, when such fuels are purchased and used for pur poses other than for the operation of motor vehicles upon the publihighways."

Affidavits Provided.

"Refunds are made to individial purchasers upon their filing with the secretary of state an af tidavit showing the use of such fuels in some other way than in motor vehicles driven over the public roads and highways, such affidavit to be accompanied in all cases by the original invoices. supply of the regular form of affidavit drafted by the ecretary of state was placed in the hands of all dealers at the time the refund law became effec ive, and users of motor fuels intending to claim a refund should procure one or more of thes orms from the dealer at the time of purchasing the fuels, or com municate a request for a supply of them to the secretary of stat

"Motor fuels used in boats, sta tionary engines, for cleaning lothing and in other industria oursuits are subject to a refund lso the fuels used in tractors exclusively, in farm Tractors operated upon th public highways are classified by aw with motor vehicles, and the oil consumed under such circumtances cannot be made the basior a claim for refund of taxes.

"The attorney general advihat the clause of the refund lay equiring a claim for refund to e filed within 90 days from the date of the invoice upon which claim is based, is strictly nandatory, there having been no revisions made for relaxing th The legislature spared to phasis in adopting this limitthe language used in the tatute being 'that application for refunds as provided hereinust be filed with the secretary of state within 90 days from the date of purchase or invoice, or


