

WILHELM SCORES AS LOW PLAYER

Oregon State Champion Golf Expert Shows Mettle in Opening Rounds

PORTLAND, June 20.—Rudolph Wilhelm, Oregon state champion golfer, showed his mettle by qualifying as low man in the preliminary round in the 1921 Pacific northwest amateur golf championships at the Waverley Country club, this total number of strokes was 111 for the 36 holes. This is two under par for the Waverley course.

Wilhelm turned in a card of 57 for the morning round, which is one over par for the first 18 holes. But in the afternoon he came back with a rush and circled the course in a 68. Dr. O. F.
