Quantity to Be Handled This Season More Than Doubles That of Last Year. Officials Declare.

"The Oregon Growers' Cooperative association within the last few days has sold a large tonnage of Royal Anne cherries, for maraschino and for canning purposes. The association will open its cherry pool-the rest of this week and Monday for cherries.

"The large tonnage which will be handled by the association this season is more than twice that handled last year.

"Two-thirds of the heavy tonnage at The Dalles is now in the association, so that the association is fast gaining a position of influence in the marketing of cherries.

"A large quantity of these cherries will be made into maraschinos at Salem, and las for maraschino use.'

The Salem Street Car company and the West Linn com-Revealed Plans of Russian pany proposed in the new tariff to increase single ride fares from 5 to 8 cents, while the Eugene Street Car company in addition to asking an advance from 5 to 8 cents on its city lines sought to raise its rate between Eugene and Springfield from 10 to 16 cents.

The new tariffs affecting the city lines of the three street car companies also included the provision that strips of six tickets would be sold for 45 cents, while books of 50 tickets good for single rides would be increased from \$2.50

The new tariffs would have become operative on July 1 had not the commission issued an order of suspension pending an investigation. Whether the increases will be allowed will be determined by the investigation. This is the first suspension of rates by the commission

under the new law enacted at the last session of the legislature. All three of the street car companies are controlled by the Southern Pacific company. Under the law the increased fares would have become
