## HIGHER CAR FARE SUSPENDED

### LARGE TONNAGE OF CHERRIES FOR MARASCHINO INCREASED RATES AND CANNING SOLD BY GROWERS' ASSOCIATION ON STREET LINES HALTED BY BOARD

#### POOL REMAINS OPEN TO TAKE GREATER CROP

Quantity to Be Handled This Season More Than Doubles That of Last Year, Officials Declare.

#### NEW INDUSTRY IS INDICATED BY DEAL

Sure Outlet is Found for Admittedly Superior Oregon Orchard Product

"The Oregon Growers' Cooperative association within the last few days has sold a large tonnage of Royal Anne cherries, for maraschino and for canning purposes. The association will open its cherry pool the rest of this week and Monday for cherries.

"The large tonnage which will be handled by the association this season is more than twice that handled last year. Two-thirds of the heavy tonnage at The Dalles is now in the association, so that the association is fast gaining a position of influence in the marketing of cherries.

"A large quantity of these cherries will be made into maraschino at Salem, and some will be processed at Dalles for maraschino use."

The above statement was given out last night by M. O. Evans, field manager for the Oregon Growers' Cooperative association. It had been known that some such deal was pending, for some time past and the growers in the association have been well satisfied to await what they were certain would be good news.

The development of the entirely new industry of maraschino cherries, is the gratifying part of the news. It does not glut the ordinary channels of trade, but finds a new outlet for the Oregon product that is admittedly superior to almost any other grown.

To break into this high class trade, and spread the fame of Oregon fruit all over the world, is considered a big step forward.

That Marion and Polk county cherry crop has a chance to carry the Salem label for this high-class maraschino is not the smallest point of local satisfaction.

Robert Paulus, general manager of the Oregon Growers association, said last night that the association expected to handle the season's crop.

Registered Electors of State Fall Far Short in Going To Polls

Receipt of figures at the office of the secretary of state showing the total vote cast in the special election of June 7 shows that 41 per cent of the people who registered for the election went to the polls. The total vote cast was 139,466 and the total registration was as follows:

Republicans—Male, 132,682; females, 82,751; total, 215,433. Democrats—Male, 59,974; females, 22,473; total, 82,447. Prohibitionists—Male, 18,226; females, 25,222; total, 43,448. Socialists—Male, 2009; females, 1924; total, 4290.
