LOCAL MAN IS GUN WIZARD

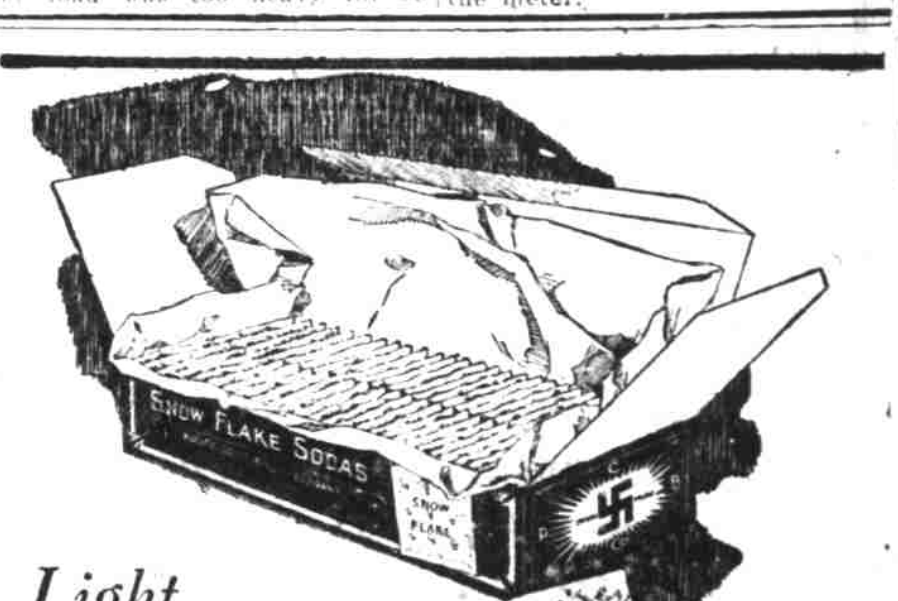
Salem, the Arrow Maker, Has Nothing on Ralph White of This Town. Ralph White has been producing for local gun men.

One is the adaptation of a Marble peep sight to a Luger pistol. The original Marble sight did not give a great deal more than the adjustable standard and the disc and the elevating screw; the gunsmith had to make the rest of the fittings, and set the sight base into the pistol frame, after cutting off the standard to almost microscopic brevity.

Another peep sight, a Lyman, was mounted on a Colt's .22 automatic for Fred J. Buchtel, by dovetailing a sight base into the "blow back" member of the arm, and it makes a real "pippin" of an arm for a shooter who shoots in the folded-arm position. Mr. White is mounting a third similar sight on a composite target pistol of his own manufacture that is a good deal of a novelty and altogether a dream for any pistol user. It was Smith & Wesson revolver frame, for which he got the long, target handle. Then he took a piece of refined Stevens .22 calibre barrel, 8 inches long, mounted it on a tip-up single barrel, dressed it up until old Colonel Sam Colt would have thrown fits of ecstasy over its balance and general lines, and he has one of the finest target pistols that any user ever saw. He at first intended to make it into a heavier calibre arm, for which purpose he chambered out a piece of Krav 20 calibre barrel to fit a Luger 20 calibre cartridge; but the Luger load was too heavy for so light an arm, so he is contenting himself with the lighter rim for the present.
