

BIDS ARE OPENED ON ASSETS OF PORTLAND BOND COMPANY

PORTLAND, Ore., June 29. — Bids for \$181,300, par value out of the \$1,098,910 of public obligation bonds and other securities of the bankrupt estate of Morris Brothers, Inc., were received Monday by Earl C. Bronaugh, trustee in bankruptcy. The bids were opened today by Trustee Bronaugh.

One proposal was in for purchase of the leasehold of the Portland office building occupied by the firm. Trustee Bronaugh said it was so low it would not be considered.

The appraised value of the leasehold is \$75,000.

No bids were submitted for the wrecked bond house's customer list written down at a book value of \$10,000. Proposals to buy \$305 worth of desks, tables and an automatic folding machine were received.

Trustee Bronaugh will have a conference with A. M. Cannon, referee in bankruptcy, before announcing what bids will be accepted, but he said most of the proposals to buy municipal bonds would be unacceptable.

taxed in the lumber schedule, but many other items were not.

The committee provided that if any country imposed a duty on any of the free list lumber exported from the United States the president might enter into negotiations with it to obtain removal of the tax and, failing, would be empowered to declare equal rates on the product imported from such country.

The leaders in the fight to have lumber remain on the free list indicated that such other differences as might exist on the subject would be adjusted. The tax of 50 cents a thousand on shingles brought some complaints from members who had been urging that no duty be imposed on any products needed at this time in relieving the housing shortage.

The oil tax was unexpected. The duty was not as high, it was said, as that proposed and rejected the other day by a vote of nine to eight, but American oil producers kept up the fight and the rate was the last important action of the committee before Chairman Fordney took the bill to the house and formally introduced it.

Along with oil the first party caucus is expected to deal with the chemical schedule and some others.

The bill sets machinery for a three-year control of dye importations and full power to supervise the importations is placed in the tariff commission, to which also is transferred from the treasury the staff now doing that work and for the continuation of which the bill appropriates \$100,000 for the next 12 months.

Provision is made for the classification by the commission of all products covered by the restrictions, dividing them so that products of the so-called infant plants will be given certain advantages over those obtainable on equal terms here or in foreign countries. It is specified that not more than a six months supply of any commodity not ob-

tainable here equally with that of foreign origin can be held by one firm or individual.

As a means of guarding the American dye industry from the inroads of foreign competition, a system of licensing is created through which the tariff commission is enabled to check the movement of every imported shipment as well as the production of the American plants. All handlers of dyes must be registered with the commission, which is empowered at any time to call for their books and records.

A provision was put into the bill which continues existing law in regard to Cuban reciprocity. Administrative provisions of the bill authorize the president to take steps to secure reciprocal trade agreements with any foreign country at any time that such action may be deemed of interest to the United States. The president also is authorized to suspend any provisions in order to increase the duties to equal the amount of bounties or grants bestowed by any foreign government on exports by its nationals to the United States.

With respect to the making of reciprocal trade agreements the bill limits such negotiations to the next three years and the term of the treaty to five years from the date of its ratification.

The bill widely extends the powers of the tariff commission, clothing it with authority to make investigations of the activities and trade practices of importers and to examine records of foreign manufacturers and exporters to this country.

The administrative sections also introduce the American valuation plan of assessing duties. It is specified that the value of imports always shall be the same as the prevailing prices in the principal markets of the United States and not the price of the purchase in foreign countries.

Stipulation also is made that all articles of foreign manufacture must bear labels, or brands, in the English language, wherever such is possible without injury to the commodity. The brand or label must show the bill provides, detailed facts concerning the

country of origin and the contents of sealed or packed shipments.
