BOOK REVIEW

"Road to Childhood" by Anne Carroll Moore. Parents and teachers will find in this book, a helpful guide for the reader in children's literature. Miss Moore expounds the fact that so much of the commonplace and mediocre has found a place on the shelves of children's libraries. There is a pleasing, conversational style, drawing upon her rich experience as children's librarian at the Pratt Institute public library and the New York public library. She discusses writing for children, and the really worth while children's book. She gives two rather extensive lists of books, in an approximate order of purchase, with names of the publishers for children under 19 years of age.

Her last chapters deal with books for young people and vacation reading for boys and girls.
