Georges Carpentier Has Longer Ring Experience To Back Him Tomorrow

EACH PUT OUT ONCE

Gloria Knocked out Frenchman and Pueblo Fireman Sang Jack to Sleep

Through several campaigns both have won and lost contests in nearly every possible manner.

Both have won by knockouts, on points and by fouls; both have lost on points and by knockouts, although Dempsey never has lost a decision on a foul, as did Carpentier to Frank Klaus, when Manager Descamps climbed into the ring to save the Frenchman from further punishment. Carpentier, fighting since 1907, is the more grizzled veteran of the two. In winning his way up from the bantamweight ranks to the heavyweight class, Carpentier, who started boxing at 14, has engaged in 85 battles. In 71 of these he emerged from the ring the victor. Thirty-four times he won by knockouts; 33 times on point decisions and four times on fouls by opponents.

Georges Knocked Out Once. The Frenchman has fought only five draws; has lost once on a foul and has been knocked out once. To a French youth named Gloria goes the credit for being the only opponent who has stood over the challenger and listened to the toll of the referee. Carpentier's record, before the war, is one of the most active credited to a leading boxer. Service in the French army curtailed his boxing for four years, but since the armistice, with a heavyweight title bout his main consideration. Georges has engaged in fewer glove contests. Jack Dempsey has fought 64 battles and 55 resulted in victories for him. The champion has knocked out 45, or almost three-fourths of his opponents in six years of boxing, a remarkable record. Nine times he has won on point decisions, and his only

victory on a foul was over the ponderous Carl Morris.

Flynn Won by K. O.

The champion has fought four draw decisions; has lost on points twice, and has hit the canvas only once to stay there for 10 seconds. "Fireman" Jim Flynn, in 1917, achieved that startling feat, but later the "Pueblo Fireman" was knocked out in less than a minute by Dempsey when the latter was on his way to the championship. Dempsey also has fought two no-decision bouts.

FRUIT FROZEN BY CANNERIES

All Canneries Busy Caring For Largest Crop in County's History

LABOR MUCH IN DEMAND

Kurtz Plant Being Equipped With Latest Labor-Saving Devices

A crazy billionaire wouldn't have dared last year to do what they are doing up at the Producers' fruit plant this week—putting down strawberries in barrels. A sweet and clean new oak barrel is three-quarters filled with the hand sorted berries; then a whole sack of sugar—a whole sack—is poured in on top, and the berries that last year would have been worth close to \$50, and the sugar that was worth another \$30, go to the cold storage plant to be frozen for future use. Such a barrel of fruit last year would have been like buying a bank or a kingdom; and they would have sent an armed guard to keep back the moochers and the burglars and the bandits; this year a hired man does it alone, and there isn't any more thrill about it than for a hunter to drive a tame cow to pasture.

The Kurtz plant is being fitted up with some of the latest labor-saving cherry furniture that means a lot in handling the fruit. A series of V-troughs, with a wide endless-belt conveyor running at the bottom, have the stemming stands alongside, where the girls stand and as the cherries are stemmed they are dropped into the trough. There are several of these hopper troughs, 30 feet or more in length, which discharge their fruit on to another broader belt that carries them to the sorter. On this sorter conveyor the fruit is spread in a thin layer and a number of keen-eyed women scan every cherry as the belt slides slowly past them, picking out the bruised or imperfect cherries and leaving only the perfect fruit. The sorter belt carries them to the machine sorter where they are "sifted" into uniform sizes. From there they go to the canners, and no perfect fruit is touched by hand in all that round. It is as sanitary as machinery can make it, and a great economy in time and cost.

At the Salem King's plant the first run of dehydrated loganberries has just come through the ovens. They look almost as glossy and perfect as the raw fruit fresh from the vines; only, the weight has been reduced by more than 80 per cent. The fruit is carefully inspected after dehydration to eliminate the too-soft berries that do not stand up like
