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TODD CASE IS NOW IN COURT

Kurtz Says Defendent Told Him Byron's Record Bad But Would Make Good

EDUCATOR PUT ON STAND
Indications Are Full Presentation of Case May Be Complete Today

John W. Todd, former superintendent of Salem schools and now defendant in the action brought against him by Salem investors in the Carlos Byron alleged land fraud cases, was the first witness called yesterday morning upon opening of the much-heralded suit. The suit is to recover money invested.

When asked why he had not used the made in connection with the land locating scheme, Todd replied that there had been no occasion for transacting by correspondence. E. J. Kurtz, who followed Todd upon the witness stand, testified that Todd had told him that Byron had a bad record but that he was shrewd enough to make good his promises.
