2 PROSECUTIONS ARE NOT LEGAL

Supreme Court Reverses Lower Tribunal in Plea Of Former Jeopardy

An unusual appeal arising from a "plea of former jeopardy" was decided on by the supreme court yesterday in the case of the state against Ward Smith, from Union county, in which an opinion by Justice John reversed Judge J. W. Knowles of the lower court and remanded the case. Rights under

the prohibition law are involved in the case. In May, 1920, information was filed in the federal court in Portland alleging that in La Grande Smith unlawfully had in his possession intoxicating liquor. He pleaded guilty in federal court and was fined \$250.

In June, 1920, Smith was indicted by the grand jury for Union county for wrongfully having intoxicating liquor in his possession. The date for the offense were the same in the information filed in the federal and in the circuit courts. April 30, 1920, in the lower court Smith pleaded former jeopardy. The state filed a demurrer, which the lower court sustained. Smith was convicted and fined \$200. He appealed.

In the reversing opinion Justice John says in conclusion:

"The plea of former jeopardy is an inherent constitutional right designed to promote the ends of justice. As we construe it, it was

never the purpose or intent of the national prohibition act that a person against whom an information had been filed in the federal court charging him with the violation of the Volstead act, to which he pleaded guilty and paid his fine could again be indicted, prosecuted, and convicted in the state court for the doing of the identical thing and on the same day charged in the information filed against him in the federal court to which he had pleaded guilty and paid his fine. The demurrer to the defendant's plea of former jeopardy should have been overruled."

Other opinions handed down by the court follow:

Edna J. McDonald, appellant, vs. George B. Bonhill, Exr., appeal from Sherman county; contest of will; opinion by Justice Brown; Judge D. R. Parker reversed.

Scandinavian-American bank vs. Wentworth Lumber company, appellant; appeal from Multnomah county; action to recover money; opinion by Justice Brown; Judge Robert G. Morrow affirmed.

defendant, and W. E. Richardson and S. T. Richardson, appellants; appeal from Multnomah county; suit to recover money; opinion by Justice Bean; Judge Robert G. Morrow reversed and case remanded.
