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## KABER CASE IS HALTED

**Defendant Seized by Fainting Spells; Is In Doctors' Hands**

**COURTROOM IN PANIC**

**Prosecutor Promises Testimony to Refute Story of Automobile Ride**

CLEVELAND, O., July 13.—Whether the trial of Mrs. Eva Catherine Kaber on a charge of murdering her husband, Daniel F. Kaber, will be resumed tomorrow following its interruption today when Mrs. Kaber broke down, will depend upon the report of two physicians who are making an examination of the accused woman tonight.

These physicians, together with two colleagues, were indicated tonight as the state's alienists to pass upon Mrs. Kaber's mental condition. All are local men.

**Trial Is Halted.**—Decision to have Mrs. Kaber's physical condition inquired into was made by Prosecutor Stanton after the court had advised that the trial could not go on until there was no doubt that Mrs. Kaber was fully conscious.

Mrs. Kaber's fainting spells began when Charles Brickell, brother of Mrs. Kaber, was being subjected to a grueling cross examination. The first fainting spell this morning was accompanied by hysterical screaming which threw the women spectators almost into a state of hysteria. Mrs. Kaber was carried from the courtroom. She was unconscious for nearly half an hour. Judge Bernon then ordered a recess until afternoon, when the other fainting attacks came. Court was then adjourned.

**Practitioner Is Called.**—The defense, it is understood, has only one more witness other than Mrs. Kaber and its alienists. The witness is Gertrude Prosser, a religious practitioner, who is expected to testify that she treated the accused woman for melancholia and nervousness for three years.

Prosecutor Stanton announced tonight that he will have testimony to rebut that given by defense witnesses that Mrs. Kaber after an automobile ride, returned to the home of her sister, Mrs. H. J. McGinnis at Cedar Point, O., about 9:30 on the evening Mr. Kaber was stabbed.

**Auto Trip in Doubt.**—Mr. Stanton said he would be able to prove that Mrs. Kaber did not return until 2 o'clock in the morning. The state has always questioned whether Mrs. Kaber was in Cedar Point on the night of the murder, as is claimed by her, or whether she actually was near the scene of the crime. The round trip from Cedar Point to Cleveland, Mr. Stanton contends can be made by automobile in less than four hours.

**DR. ELLIS TELLS OF TRIP NORTH**

**Salem Physician and Wife Now Visiting at Ketchikan, Alaska**

A letter received from Dr. G. V. Ellis, who with his wife recently set out from Salem to Ketchikan, Alaska, tells of their safe arrival at the northland port. They visited for a day in Seattle, then took a day in Victoria, and finally got their steamer for the north.

Ketchikan is a city of a little more than 500 population, and a thriving, hustling business place. The Ellises visited the little Indian town, nearby, Maklatani, where Father Duncan did his wonderful missionary work to the early Alaskan Indians.

On the ship which lay at anchor in the stream just before sailing from Victoria, a naval prisoner who was held on the ship jumped overboard and started to swim ashore, a full mile away. He was a powerful swimmer, and beat the boat that was soon on his trail. But when he reached land he collapsed, as he tried to climb to a bank, and was unconscious for a number of hours after he was brought back to the ship.

On one of the steamer excursions out from Ketchikan, a huge seal came alongside and apparently challenged the captain to a race. The captain was not a very game sport, for he grabbed a rifle and took a shot at the animal, but missed. The seal is still at liberty, so far as the Ellises know.

Dr. Ellis has gone to Ketchikan for an extended visit with his son, Dr. V. Ellis, a graduate of Willamette, who has built up a great professional business in his seven years in Alaska. He has been having an almost 24-hour-a-day surgical schedule for many months past, there being a vast territory to draw from, and he having established a reputation as a skillful surgeon.
