

STATE BOARD HAS REPORT PREPARED

Biennial Pamphlet of Horticultural Body Available For Distribution

The 16th biennial report of the Oregon state board of horticulture, 1921, is available for distribution. The volume contains 200 pages and is illustrated with many full page cuts. In addition to many smaller ones which accompany special articles. The report outlines the work done by the board in the past two years as it was conducted by commissioners of the five districts. The state horticultural and quarantine laws are given in full. The nursery law is stated and the apple and pear grading law presented. The more recent quarantine regulations of the United States department of agriculture are given. Many articles by prominent fruit men of Oregon are found in the work and a large section is devoted to description of fruit diseases and pests, with the best

means of controlling them, much of the material coming from Oregon Agricultural college. Useful tables state the proper time and spray to use for all of the common diseases and insects on apples, pears, prunes, cherries and peaches, and directions are given for making sprays and grafting wax. There are also tables of information containing statistics which the fruit grower so often has need of.

Channel to Sea is in Best Shape in Years

PORTLAND, Or., July 21.—There has been less shelling of the channel from Portland to the sea this year than in former years, with the result that it will require less dredging to place the channel at project width according to Manager J. R. Polhemus of the port of Portland. Three dredges of the port and two of the United States army engineers will be at work removing shoals from the channel next week. The five dredges are now preparing to begin operations and several will start this week. Dredging will begin a month earlier than in 1920 and as there is less to be done it is expected the channel can be cleared of all obstructions in a short time, thus permitting of additional permanent work in widening and deepening the channel.

Mrs. M. J. Wessels Widely Known as Industrial Interior Decorator

Mr. and Mrs. S. C. Bostwick of Everett, Wash., Mr. and Mrs. D. Earl Pearson of Portland and Mrs. M. J. Wessels of Portland, made a brief visit Thursday at the home of Mr. and Mrs. C. J. Lisle, 1031 South Thirteenth street. Mr. Bostwick is an attorney of Everett and Mrs. Wessels is his sister. Mrs. Wessels is one of the foremost industrial interior decorators of America. She and her husband, the late M. J. Wessels of Spokane, did some wonderful work for the state of Idaho at the St. Louis exposition, in "painting" pictures and decorating with grains, grasses and fruits, for which the state gave each of them a grand gold medal and the thanks of the legislature. For many years they were in constant demand all over the country, for decorative and fruit preservative work. Mrs. Wessels one year put up 1500 jars of fruit

for the Great Northern railroad exhibits—hugs jars, up to several gallons apiece—and the road officials said it was the best advertising they ever put out. She has had such work in California, at all the great national, state and district expositions for a number of years, and has hardly a peer in the country as an exhibitor of products. She has been asked by Mrs. Winnie Braden, manager of the Oregon exhibit at Portland, to assist in preparing the most wonderful display of state products ever gathered for the Portland world's fair in 1925, and is now looking for material for this monumental presentation. Mr. Wessels, who spent a lifetime in this decorative exhibit work, was killed in an automobile accident three years ago, since which time his gifted wife has carried on the work with conspicuous success. They had worked together for more than 20 years aal over the northwest and in California.
