Cotton Goods Have Hit Low Level, Says Kafoury

Cotton goods have about struck their lowest level, according to N. C. Kafoury, who recently returned from the east.

Mr. Kafoury is of the opinion that for the better goods there will be gradual increases in price, due largely to the fact that the cotton crop this year is a partial failure and that cotton is advancing in price.

However, it is not so much the price of raw cotton that counts, Mr. Kafoury said, as the continuing high labor costs which have not come down materially from the high war levels. The cost of manufacture in many instances is now three times that of the pre-war period.

Hence with such conditions Mr. Kafoury is inclined to think that the low level price for cotton goods has been reached, and that from now on for better goods there will be an upward tendency in the market.

Salem Minister Made Superintendent of New Pennsylvania Province

Chosen from a field of more than a thousand pastors of the United Evangelical church in the United States, Rev. and Mrs. S. S. Mumey were informed by telegram Friday of their election as heads of the Evangelical orphanage at Lewisburg, Pa.

The selection comes as a complete surprise to Rev. and Mrs. Mumey as well as to their congregation of the First Evangelical church of Salem. By the terms of the appointment they will leave as soon as possible for the new charge.

The newly erected Evangelical orphanage was dedicated at Lewisburg, Wednesday, and is a \$50,000 structure located near the Evangelical Old People's home of that city which formerly was Salem minister, Rev. A. A. Winter, is superintendent.

Mr. Mumey has lived in Salem for nine years and for seven years was superintendent of the Oregon conference, this district.

Mr. Mumey will be superintendent of the institution while Mrs. Mumey will assume the duties of matron.

BANDITS' LAIR REPORTED FOUND

Officers Locate Hiding Place Of Men Who Held Up Mazama Party

LA PINE, Ore., Aug. 6.—Officers in search of the highwayman who held up a party of Mazamas yesterday at Beaver Marsh, 20 miles south of Crescent, Ore., reported having found the supposed hiding place of the bandits in a house on the abandoned experimental farm of the Hunter Land company at Lonoth 24 miles south of Crescent.

The farmhouse, which has been deserted for years, showed fresh evidence of occupation by two men, the officers said.

Residents report having seen men answering the description of the bandits in that vicinity. The strangers were using a "kraz" roadster," according to reports, which apparently fits the description of the car used by the bandits, one of whom has been identified by several persons as Dr. Brumfield, the missing Roseburg Centist.
