Large Highway Warrants Paid by Secretary Kozer

Secretary of State Sam Kozer yesterday paid 68 claims against the state highway fund, aggregating \$492,046.59. Of this amount \$286,422.32 was payments on contracts for road and highway construction; \$22,945.94 covered payments for cement purchased; \$12,796.47 included the amounts paid for gas, oils, freight, etc.; \$8,000 is six months' interest on \$400,000 bond issue; \$262,951.86 covered claims for miscellaneous supplies, labor and the like. The largest claim was for \$40,429.19, which was a payment on account of one of the contracts for road and highway construction. This is rather an unusual amount, being an accumulation of contract payments.

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NO CONFLICT IS SEEN IN STATUTE

Attorney General Rules on Fair Association Law For Walter Evans

The Oregon law providing that the county commissioners of any county having more than 50,000 inhabitants, may appropriate money to any agricultural fair association which has a corporate existence, for the purpose of holding a fair and agricultural exhibit, is not in conflict with that part of the state constitution which provides that no county, city, town or other municipal corporation shall become a stockholder in any joint company, corporation or association, or raise money for, or loan its credit to or in aid of such company, corporation or association. This was made plain yesterday by J. H. VanWinkle, attorney general, in a legal opinion handed down at the request of Walter H. Evans, district attorney of Multnomah county.

The county making the grant of money to assist in paying expenses and premiums awarded at such fair does not become a business partner or stockholder of any such company, corporation or association holding the fair," said Mr. VanWinkle's opinion. "The corporation only receives the money in trust as disbursing agent for the county, and is required by statute to account for its disposition with complete vouchers covering all of its expenditures of such money. "The corporation and the county are but joining in promoting agricultural, horticultural, stock and other industries of the community, and the corporation acts in the capacity of an instrumentality of the county."

Portland Wheat Shipment Doubles That of 1920

PORTLAND, Aug. 17.—Terminal receipts on wheat in Portland to date are running more than double the figures of last year according to a report issued today by the merchant's exchange which indicates terminal receipts of wheat in Portland to date at 35.67 cars, as against 17.85 cars last year, or about five million bushels already.

Articles Are Filed by Plumber Oil Company

The Plumber Oil company, with a capital stock of \$20,000, has been incorporated by C. J. Dondero, E. R. Steen and L. M. Lapper. Headquarters will be in Portland. Articles were filed by the corporation yesterday.

A. G. Bettman, T. L. Perkins and T. E. Hotchkiss have incorporated the Black Bear Coal Mining company, with headquarters in Portland. The capital stock is \$100,000.

Bonds Are Delivered By State Treasurer

O. P. Hoff, state treasurer, yesterday delivered to the United States National bank in Portland, state highway bonds aggregating a value of \$2,000,000. These bonds were sold at a recent meeting of the state highway commission in Portland and brought \$2,007,828. The securities were bid in by John E. Price of Seattle.

Bonds Shall be Accepted At Par, Says Van Winkle

FEDERATIONS TO TOUR NUT GROVES

Arrangements Made at Joint Meeting Held at Amity Tuesday Night

At the joint meeting held Tuesday night at Amity of the Marion County Community federation and the Yamhill County Community federation, it was decided to make a tour of the walnut growing districts of Marion and Yamhill counties on September 1 and 2. Every one interested in the culture of walnuts is invited to join and particulars may be had at the Salem Commercial club.

In order that people living in the two counties may become better acquainted, it was arranged at the meeting that road celebration shall be held at Dayton on Labor day, September 5. Speaking to delegates of both counties, L. J. Chapin, one of the Marion county delegates, called attention to the fact that Marion county intended to hold a big poultry and corn show in Salem the second week in December. He invited all the Yamhill people to come and look the show over.

Taking as a model the booklet issued by the Marion County Community federation, the Yamhill County federation will soon issue one, telling of Yamhill county attractions. Like the Marion county book, each small town or community will be allowed an equal space with the larger towns. To prepare the booklet, a Yamhill county committee was appointed consisting of Dr. William Stryker of Minerva, J. U. Smith of Nehalem valley and R. K. Harris of Dundee.

The next joint meeting of the federations will be held at Newberg on September 13.
