Prunes in the Willamette valley will average a third of a ton of the dried product to the acre this year. These figures are the result of estimates just completed by the field men of the Oregon Growers' association, and though they do not cover the entire acreage of the valley, they represent all sections and may be taken as indicative of the general trend.

A ton to the acreage is a fair average for a normal season and a year's crop will be a third of the average yield. Some orchards will yield more than a ton to the acre.

RACING BOATS COMPETE SOON

Portland Power Racer Will Try For Pennant at Detroit Meet

DETROIT, Mich., Aug. 26—Two sets of brothers will represent America in two of the fastest boats at the Gold Cup and Harmsworth trophy power boat races here beginning Aug. 27 and running until September 5, according to present indications.

The brothers will be in Miss America II, being built by Gar Wood to defend the two trophies, and her predecessor, Miss America, with which he won them last year.

Gar Wood will drive the new speed craft with Jay Smith handling the engine. The first Miss America, to be entered for Gar Wood, Jr., will be piloted by Wood's brother, George B. Wood, which his mechanical adviser will be Bernard Smith, brother of Jay.

With six American entries already indicated for the Harmsworth, to oppose Sir Mackay Edgar's Maple Leaf VII, elimination trials September 1 and 2, are apparently certain. Under the rules of competition no country may enter more than three contestants in the race proper, and a lively struggle for the honor of representing the United States is in prospect.

Besides the two Miss America, the United States entries include Miss Chicago of the Chicago Yacht club, Miss Promise of Buffalo, Miss Portland of Portland, Or., and Disturber IV of Chicago.

Miss America II is rapidly nearing completion. Her keel was laid here June 7. Gar Wood anticipates she will be capable of running 10 miles an hour faster than her predecessor, which reached 70 miles an hour in the mile championship dashes last year.

The four 12-cylinder airplane motors to be installed in Miss America II are expected to develop 1800-horse power.
