Common School Fund To Receive Addition From Unclaimed Deposits

BIENNIAL REPORT MADE

Ninety-one of 287 Banks In **Oregon Contribute Small** Amount Each

Ninety-one of a total of 287 banks in Oregon have filed reports with Secretary of State Kozer showing unclaimed commercal and savings deposits in their vaults aggregating \$21,648.71 as compared with \$13,263.55 for the preceding biennium. Under the \$151.50. law these deposits are deemed to have escheated to the state of \$261.04. Oregon and the attorney general is directed by statute to demand \$22.17. their payment from all banks reporting such deposits to the state \$6.94. treasurer for the benefit of the

common school fund. Incompetents Not Affected Biennially in July the banks of this state are required to return to the secretary of state a sworn \$22.69. statement showing the amount standing to he credit of every depositor who shall not have made deposit, or who shall not have \$50. withdrawn any part of his deposit, principal or interest for a period \$13,65. of more than seven years. Savings deposits, however, do not escheat \$123.66. to the state until the expiration of 12 years in Neu of the sevenyear period which applies only to commercial deposits. deposits to the sccretary of state, the banks are required to publish copies of their own sworn statements in a newspaper of general circulation for four consecutive weeks, the cost of such publication to be paid pro rata out of said unclaimed deposits.
