GOOD SCHOOLS ARE PROSPECT

Silverton Educational Year Opens September 26— Enrollment Grows

SILVERTON, Or., Sept. 8.—(Special to The Statesman.)—Due to the fact that the entire heating plant of the schools had to be overhauled, the opening date has been postponed from September 19 to September 26. Superintendent H. T. Yowel says that an exceedingly large enrollment is looked for this year. Physical education which has been sadly neglected heretofore in the Silverton schools, will be featured under the leadership of Harry Romig, one of the new instructors, will be featured. The high school dramatic club is already at work, and Superintendent Yowel says there is good material for a debate team. The teachers for the ensuing year are: H. C. Tschang, principal; Miss Hazel Knight of Dallas, English; Miss Mervil Hixcox of Berkeley, Calif., Latin and English; Miss Edna Gilbert of Salem, Spanish and library; Miss Fern Pills of Salem, general science and biology; Miss Marian Chase of Corvallis, home economics; Miss Violet Croff of Portland, commercial instructor; C. M. Freeman of Silverton, manual training and mechanical drawing; Harry Romig of Forest Grove, physics and mathematics; J. D. Penzance of Forest Grove, history and athletics. The seventh and eighth grades of the public schools are to be run this year on the plan of the Junior high school, featuring the study of the vocations, including sewing, manual training, music and art. Mrs. Blanche Coe of Turner will be principal of this department. Assisting her will be Miss Rosella Richardson, Miss Vida Bennett of Silverton and Miss Hazel Brewer of Portland. There will be 13 teachers in the grades below these. As soon as the new grade building is completed, the frame building will be remodeled for a manual training artshraamoshridiao art building for the high school.

ELLIS WRITES MORE OF TRIP

Salem Physician Is Invited To Go Bear Hunting In Alaska Wilds

A letter from Dr. G. V. Ellis, who with his wife has been visiting their son, Dr. R. V. Ellis, at Ketchikan, Alaska, says that they are having the time of all their lives up at the old Russian town. The doctor has been prowling around, gathering up an arsenal of ancient firearms. One is a carbine that for a long time was used as a whale-killer, to shoot 'em after they had been well harpooned and towed up close to the boat, so the shooter couldn't miss. Another is a rifle that was dug out from under the floor of the old United States marshal's office, where it had rested for many years. There is a story to this gun, as long as a best-selling novel. The doctor, who used to be a famous hunter, has had the invitation to go bear hunting, where

he could ride most of the way in a fast motor boat, and by a walk of 300 yards reach the spot where bear, deer and mountain goats were bound to come. He writes as enthusiastically over this prospect as a new mother over her first baby boy. They have been picking wild raspberries by the barrel-ful in the Ellis back yard, almost overhanging the bay. They have fished and eaten fish caught by others, until the doctor says they ought to be able to swim all the way home without a quiver. Some of the trout that are taken from the bay and the streams on the mainland are up to 30 inches in length. The deer season was to open September 1, when almost the whole sporting population turns out to get at least one "with horns." Dr. Ellis had a letter from the late Frank Turner, clerk of the Oregon supreme court, in which Mr. Turner said that he and his daughter planned to take the steamer Alameda for a "visit" to Ketchikan and the Ellises turned out en masse to meet the visitors.
