

SINGLE G WINS CHAMPION STAKE

Three Straight Heats Taken In Free-For-All Pace, Best Time 2:02

SYRACUSE, N. Y., Sept. 12.—Single G, 11-year-old pacer, owned by W. B. Barefoot, of Cambridge City, Ind., won the champion stake, free-for-all pace in the grand circuit meeting in straight heats here today, stepping the second heat in two minutes flat and equalling the fastest time on this track. Best time 2:02.

King Etawah, driven by Ben White, in winning the merchants' cup, the two-year-old trot, equalled the record for the year for his class when he negotiated the mile in 2:05 3/4 in the third heat. Outdistanced in the first heat. King Etawah finished first, taking the two last from Edith Worthy. Best time 2:11 1/4.

The 2:15 trot was won by Warner's Legal J, after a hard battle in four heats. Legal J took the last two after Crane's Let Fly had annexed the first. Let Fly had to be content with second place. Best time 2:07 3/4.

The 2:13 pacing event went to Tony Mack, after the prettiest home stretch brush of the afternoon. The time was 2:06 3/4, made by Queen Abbe in the last heat.

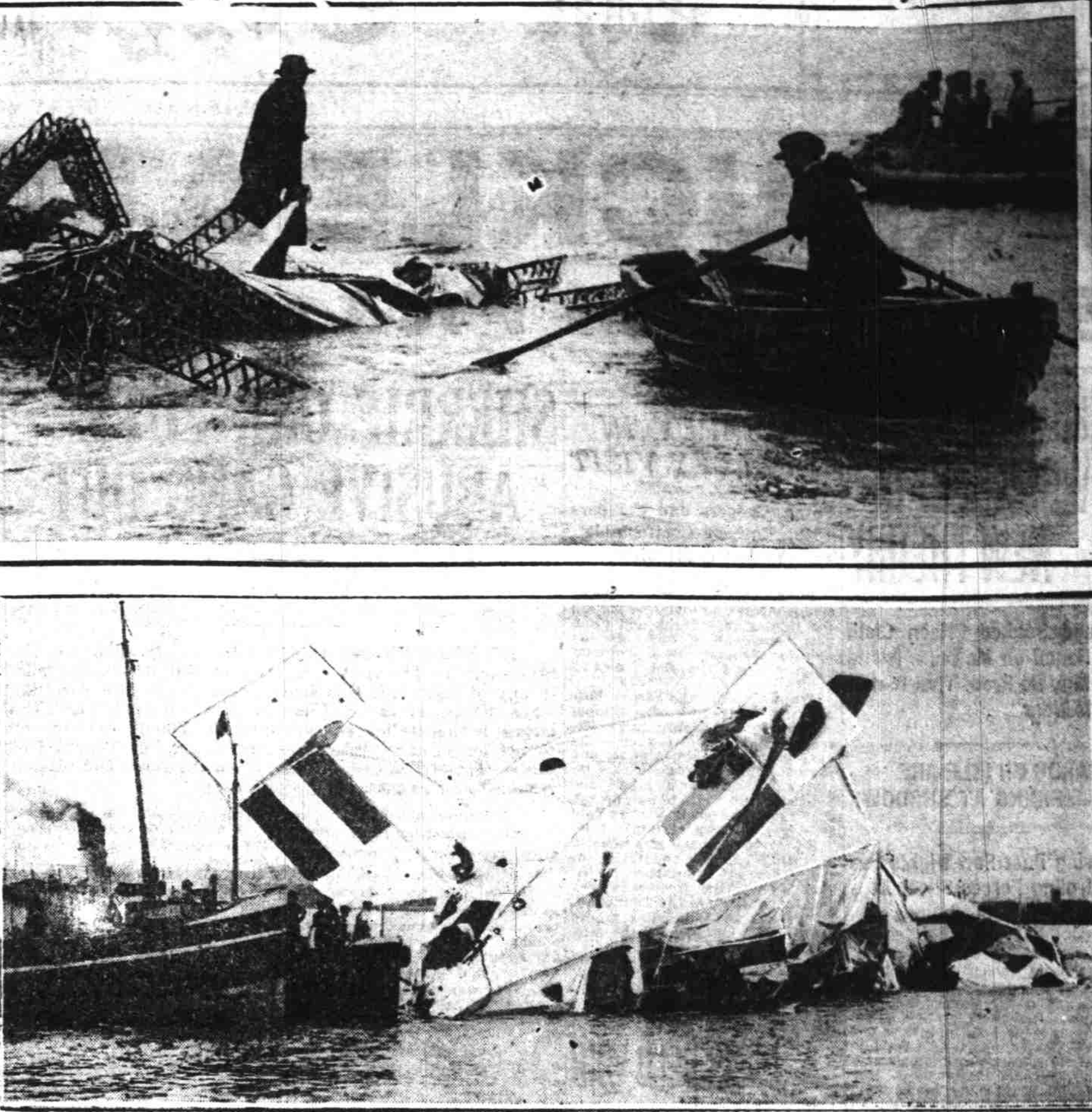
Bodies of ZR-2 Victims Will Reach New York From England Friday

All Night Sessions

Sulphur Fumes Healthful

Paper Mill Boosted

E. T. Barnes, general manager of the Oregon Pulp & Paper company, told briefly some interesting facts about the paper mill. It employs 150 men, aside from all the wood haulers, wood cutters and others away from Salem. It uses between 40 and 50 cords of wood a day, mostly white fir, that has practically no other market here. Some other non-resinous woods can be used, like the hemlock or possibly the yellow pine; the sulphite process used here will not treat the resinous woods like the red fir.
