

PAGE SENTENCED BY JUDGE BROWN

Silverton Man Convicted in City Court of Liquor Law Violation

SILVERTON, Or., Sept. 23.—(Special to The Statesman.)—After deliberating about 20 minutes the city jury returned a verdict against Joe Page, who appeared in the Silverton court this morning on a moonshine charge. He was said to have had liquor

in his possession. Judge P. L. Brown imposed a fine of \$100 and 30 days' imprisonment. Page was returned to the county jail by Sheriff Bower to serve his sentence. Page was arrested on September 2 by Robert B. Mount, a deputized officer, who had been detailed to work upon the case. The arrest was made in the small wood lot between McClaine street and the Geiser addition. Some children who had been playing there had found the cache of moonshine hidden beside a tree. Page demanded a jury trial, and Otto Paltfener, Henry Schroeder, B. Tingstad, Oscar Phelps and Ole Moe were drawn as jurors.

The witnesses in the case were Ernest and Warren Butler, Carl Bokke and Roscoe Reeves. The two first witnesses testified that they had seen Page in the vicinity of the cache on the day the arrest was made and that they had hunted around and found the moonshine.

Mr. Bokke and Mr. Reeves testified that they had ridden with Page on September 2 in Mr. Brokke's car along the Geiser addition road to the railroad track. Here Mr. Page left them and told them to turn the car. Mr. Mount testified that when Page left the car he went to the place where the liquor was hidden and picked up the two jugs containing the liquor. As Page started to return to the car Mr. Mount placed him under arrest.

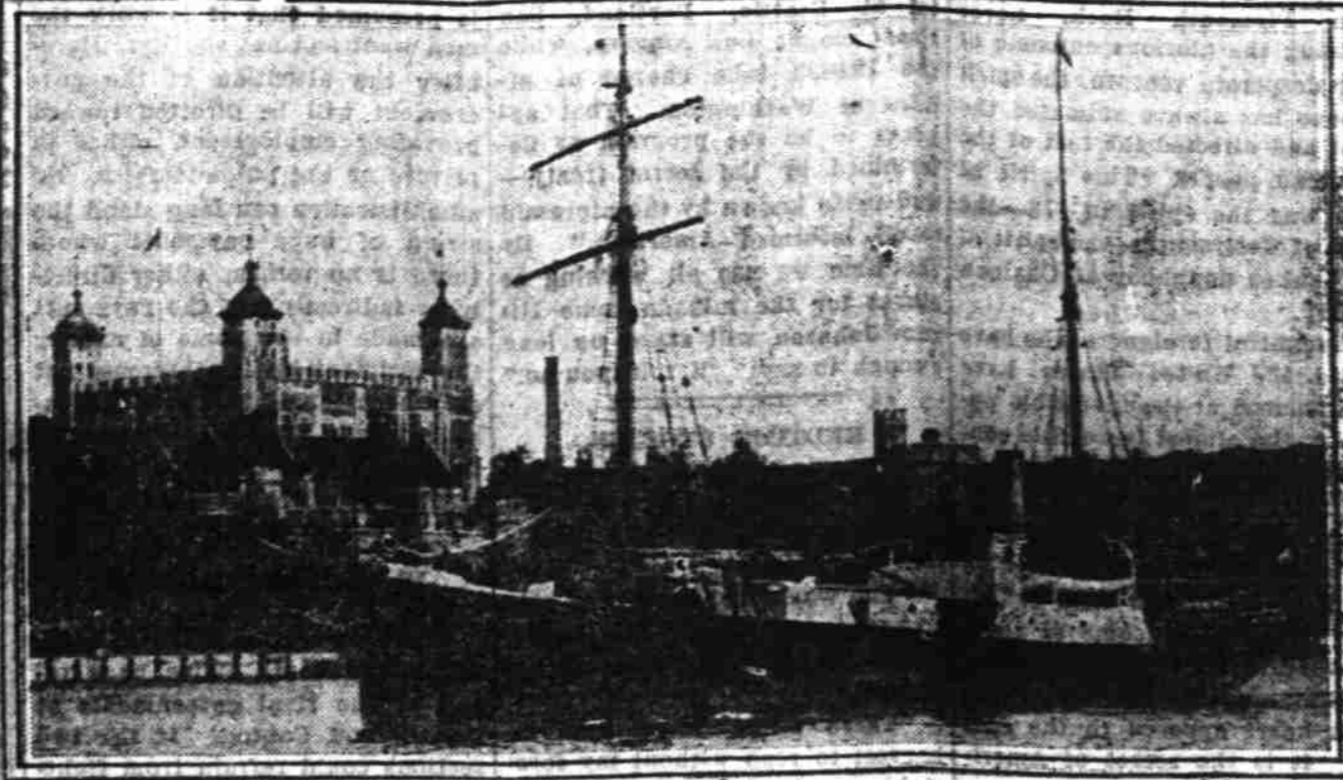

UNEMPLOYED ARE CITY'S PROBLEM

Gotham's Charity Groups to Pool Efforts in Preparing for Winter Situation

NEW YORK, Sept. 24.—Half a million men will be idle in New York this winter, in the opinion of reliable investigators, and the city has set machinery in motion to meet this situation. In addition to relief measures planned by a special city committee named by Mayor Hylan, 53 charity organizations have decided to pool their resources and establish a general clearing house in order to avoid duplication of effort and handle the problem efficiently.

The Merchants' association of New York and the Brooklyn Chamber of Commerce have now joined hands with the Central Trades and Labor council and the Building Trades council to formulate a practical program. These organizations believe the situation can be met partly by pushing building projects, thus giving employment to thousands.
