Independence Road Case Soon Ready for Trial
Trial of the case of certain residents of Independence, Polk county, against the state highway commission, seeking to prevent the construction of some of the planned state roads in that county, will probably be reached in a few weeks, according to J. M. Devers, attorney for the commission. The plaintiffs declare that the Polk county court is without legal authority to designate certain sections of the west Side Pacific highway as market roads, and that the court erred in entering into contracts of more than \$5000 to make the improvements. Judges Pipes of Portland, representing the plaintiffs, has prepared his reply to Mr. Devers' answer, it is said. Judge Kelly of Albany will try the case. The suit is important in that it will determine for all time the rights of county courts concerning the designation of market roads.
