BOAT LIEN LAW IS HELD VALID

Supreme Court Reverses Action Brought Against Steamship Company

The supreme court, in an opinion by Chief Justice Burnet, yesterday reversed and remanded for new trial the case of Joseph C. Cordney against the Ebe steamship company, appealed from Multnomah county.

Cordney was working on a dock in Portland while the steamship Ebe was discharging a cargo of cement. He was injured and sued the steamship company under the state boat lien law. The owners came in and averred that the boat lien law was unconstitutional on grounds that it was a violation of the wartime jurisdiction of the United States courts. The supreme court holds that the boat lien law is constitutional and not a violation and in this respect holds against the appellant company.

Another question was whether the case could be tried by jury or by the court. In the lower court of Judge Kavanaugh in Multnomah county the case was tried before a jury and the supreme court remands it to be tried as a suit in equity.

Two other opinions handed down by the supreme court were: M. Syverson, et al, vs John J. Serry, appellant; appeal from Clackamas county; suit for money decree and to foreclose lien on stock pledged as security for guaranty contained in written contract. Opinion by Justice Harris. Judge J. U. Campbell affirmed.

Joe Bottig, appellant, vs Fred Polky; appeal from Multnomah county; suit for damages for personal injuries. Opinion by Justice Harris. Judge John P. Kavanaugh affirmed.

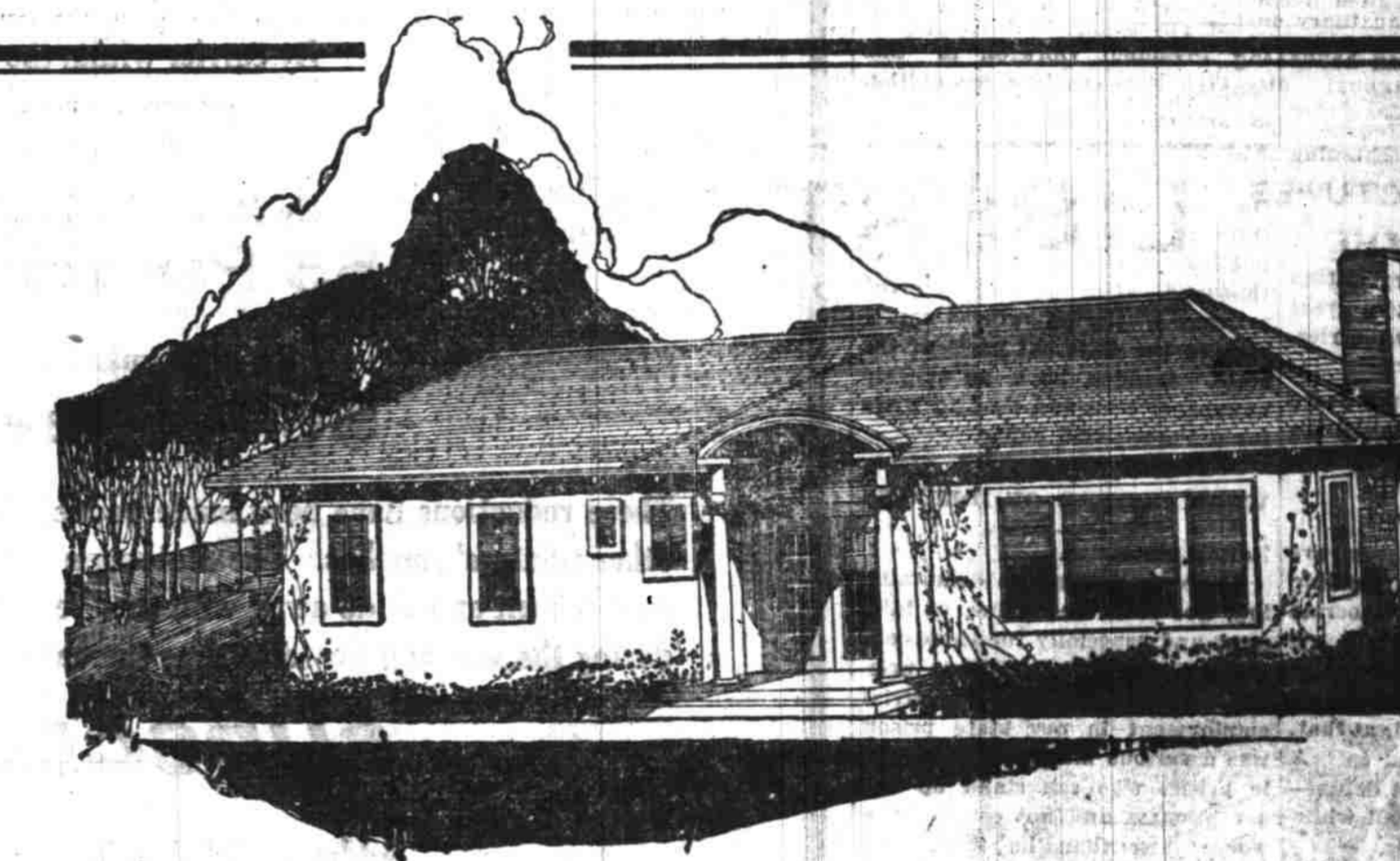
