cate can be sold to any person and will hold good as a lien against the property. According of the Jefferson schools for the to Ray L. Smith, city attorney, such a certificate of delinquency can be foreclosed just the same as any other certificate of delinquency for unpaid taxes. After such a certificate is issued, it draws interest at the rate of 12 per cent annually.
