

TROTTER RECORD OF WORLD BROKEN

Peter Manning, in Race Against Time, Negotiates Oval in 1:57 3-4

LEXINGTON, Ky., Oct. 6.—Peter Manning, Irving Gleason's great five-year-old gelding today trotted the fastest mile ever recorded against time when he turned the oval at the Lexington track in 1:57 3-4. Driven by Thomas W. Murphy, the speedy gelding went the first quarter in 30, the half in 59-2, to the three quarter pole in 1:29 and flashed under the wire in 1:57 3-4. The new record clips a quarter of a second off the old mark held jointly by Peter Manning and Uhlman. Uhlman trotted a mile at Lexington October 8, 1912, in 1:58 and Peter Manning tied this mark three weeks ago at Syracuse. Arion Guy, bay son of Guy Axworthy-Margaret Parish also starting against time clipped a second and a half off the world's record for 4-year-olds when Murphy piloted him around the oval in 1:59 1-2. His fractional time was: 30, 59 3-4, 1:29 3-4, 1:59 1-2. The scheduled feature of today's program, the Transylvania 2:05 trot, for a purse of \$5000, went to Greyworthy in straight heats with Periscope second to the gray gelding in both heats. Fast time was made in the event the first heat being trotted in 2:04 1-4 and the second in 2:03 flat. The Cumberland for 2:08 pacers, unfinished from Wednesday, resulted in victory for Jimmy McKeon, the bay gelding beating Walter K. in a stiff stretch drive.

In the heat that decided the event—Best time 2:01 3-4. The other three events on the program were split affairs. Queen Abbe got the decision in the second race after four hard heats. Best time 2:05. Escotillo captured the third race, the 2:11 trot by winning the second and third heats after Louise E. DeLopez had won the opener. Best time 2:06 1-2. The fifth race the 2:10 pace was unfinished. Uriko and Roger C. each winning a heat before darkness ended racing for the day. Best time 2:05 3-4.

Ruth's base stealing feat was performed late in the inning and did not result in a run. Not so, however, the surprise swung by the next most justly celebrated slugger of "murderer's row"—the lanky Bob Meusel. The little Californian did nothing less than execute a clean steal of home in the eighth—duplicating McNally's feat of Wednesday. He didn't have to slide for it, either, for the pitch on which he tore in was wide and Earl Smith, the startled catcher, let it get away from him for a passed ball.

The Giant rooters got their chance again today to grow enthusiastic over the playing of the remarkable Frank Frisch. This stellar performer undoubtedly prevented the score taking on a decidedly more lopsided aspect. He made a great catch of a sizzling liner by Meusel, labeled for two bases, with two on, in the Yankee first inning, turning the smash into a double play. Then, in the third, he brought the crowd to its feet with his brilliant performance in grabbing a difficult grounder from McNally, throwing himself at the ball and then while flat on the ground, reaching up and tagging Walter Pipp, who was tearing for third.

Ruth is Passed. Much of the excitement of the game was crowded into the Yankees' third inning. Schang started by sending a high fly to Baneroff. Rawlings squirmed and twisted to get under Hoyt's Texas leaguer but was unable to hold the ball. Peckinpaugh walked and the crowd yelled to Ruth to hit 'er out as the Babe came to bat. Coach Leary of the Yankees here ran out from the dugout and drew Moriarty's attention to the ball. The umpire examined it and threw it out of the game. Pitcher Hoyt took no chances with the home-run hitter and passed him to first filling the bases. This brought up Bob Meusel, another hard hitter, but the best he could do was to send up a short fly to Baneroff, leaving the three base runners stranded.

Wide-Throw Costly. The Yanks scored their first run in the fourth inning. After Pipp had sent a high fly to Young, Ward got a hit on a slow bouncer. McNally hit to Nehf, who in trying to throw out Ward at second shot the ball wide and both runners were safe.

Wally Schang drew a pass, filling all the corners. Ward tallied the first run as Hoyt went out on a grounder Rawlings to Kelly. McNally tried to score as the play was being made at first and was nipped at the plate by Kelly's good throw to Smith.

Nothing further happened in the scoring line until the eighth when the Yankees added two. Frisch muffed Peckinpaugh's easy fly back of second base. Ruth smashed a grounder to Kelly who threw out Peckinpaugh at second. Baneroff taking the throw. Ruth sprinted to third on Bob Meusel's single to center and came home as Pipp was going out on a grounder. Rawlings to Kelly. Meusel took third on the play. Then the unexpected again happened—Meusel's steal home, amid cheers that shook the grandstand. Ward ended the inning by fouling out to Kelly.

Receipts Are Enormous. In addition to establishing a new world's series record of two consecutive shutouts by the same team in the first two games, the gate receipts record established yesterday also went by the board. The 34,834 spectators who witnessed the Yankees' second victory paid \$115,320. This was more than six times the gate receipts in the second game of the 1905 series which was the first played at the Polo grounds un-

der the National commission rules. By a strange coincidence the Giants lost that game to the Philadelphia Athletics on the same field and by the same score as that of today's contest. Chief Bender did the hurling for Connie Mack and it was the only game won by the Athletics in the famous shutout series. At that time the first of the series in New York, 24,992 persons paid \$18,988.

Final Total Estimated. Of the \$115,320 paid today the players will receive \$58,913.20; the clubs \$39,208.80, and the advisory board \$17,298. If interest in the series continues and the play should extend to six or seven games, a new total receipts record is almost certain in view of the high prices being charged for both reserved and unreserved seats at the Polo grounds. The present record for gate receipts is held by the 1915 series between the Cincinnati and Chicago clubs when \$722,414 was taken in during the eight games.

Batteries Named. The consensus of opinion among local sports writers is that the batteries tomorrow will be Shawkey and Schang for the Yanks and Snyder for the Giants.

Great pitching, great fielding and daring base running gave us "the victory," said Manager Huggins tonight. "My men played the same kind of a dashing game that they did on Wednesday and the Giants were unable to reach the plate."

Ready for Action. "As for tomorrow's game, I will pitch either Bob Shawkey or Harry Harper. Both are ready and anxious for a crack at the Giants."

"They're not hitting," said Manager McGraw of the Giants, and they are not playing the kind of ball that wins games. There also have been several close decisions given against the Giants. I thought Burns was safe on his steal in the eighth inning.

"We are not discouraged over our two defeats. It will make us fight all the harder for tomorrow's game. I am going to pitch Toney tomorrow."

only post-hole digger of its kind in the state of Oregon, and one of the few in the west. It was sent to Oregon from San Francisco. 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Salem high school, present enrollment 690; last year 640; Washington Junior high school, present 538, last year 433; Lincoln, present 224, last year 194; McKinley, present 190, last year 164.

The need of two new teachers at Washington Junior high and of an assistant principal at Lincoln was presented to the board and Superintendent Hug was authorized to employ such extra teachers as would be needed to cope with the increased enrollment. Two additional instructors in the English department, a teacher of primary grades and an instructor for the manual training department will probably be employed prior to the next meeting of the board.

That Washington Junior high school is too small and cannot accommodate its present enrollment was reported. In all an increase of 209 students is enrolled in all the advanced grades. This congestion would be relieved by the installation of larger classes in the senior high school. Superintendent Hug said.

Due to the general overcrowding, new equipment will be needed in many of the schools and the immediate purchase of this was authorized. A demand for shower equipment at McKinley school was referred to the building committee.

MT. ANGEL SUIT READY FOR JURY

Clara Hougham and Martin Horst Hope to Receive Damages of \$12,000

The \$12,000 damage suit against the city of Mt. Angel for damages to the farms of Clara B. Hougham and Martin Horst on account of the city's sewerage system, will go to the jury this morning. All evidence was offered by both sides yesterday afternoon.

The plaintiffs brought witnesses to swear that the smell from the sewerage system of Mt. Angel could be noticed a quarter of a mile from the homes of the two plaintiffs. And to prove that "noisy" conditions resulted from the sewerage from the city passing into the creek that flowed through the Hougham and Horst tracts, the prosecution brought a quart can filled with the brown colored water and substance found in the creek.

As a defense witnesses for Mt. Angel swore that during the greater part of the year the water was clear and that the sewerage system complied with all regulations of the state board of health. It was also alleged that after the suit had been filed, that by order of the state board of health, chloride of lime had been placed in the septic tank from which the sewerage flows towards the farms of the defendants.

Shortly after 9 o'clock this morning, Judge Kelly will instruct the jury.
