In line with its policy of keeping closely in touch with the needs of the public schools of the state, the Oregon Normal has established a course of dramatic art which will prepare teachers not only for coaching plays in grammar and high school, but will enable them to take charge of community dramatic work. Procedure Made Known When Banks Mislead

When a bank executes and delivers a county assessor's statement of the assets of the bank as of March 1, which statement erroneously represents the undivided profits of the bank to be a certain amount, the bank is offered an opportunity to have the mistake corrected by application to the board of equalization, according to an opinion of Attorney General Van Winkle to the district attorney of Deschutes county. This refers to cases where the true amount was less than represented.

If the bank neglects to make such application, the money paid for taxes in excess of the amount that would have been required under the true valuation is considered as having been paid under a mistake of fact and cannot be recovered. It is held that by making application to the board of equalization to have the erroneous assessment corrected, the bank is given an opportunity to appeal from the decision of the board of equalization and have the matter adjusted in the courts.

MORE BOYS THAN GIRLS IN SCHOOL

Strong Majority Shown for Male Students in Marion County This Year

When it comes to a number of the rural schools in Marion county, the old story of girls being in the majority does not hold good.

For instance, there is the Jefferson school. According to recent figures filed in the county superintendent's office, there are now attending the Jefferson school 95 boys and 99 girls.

At the Turner school it is an even break, according to the present enrollment. There are just 54 boys and 54 girls attending at Turner.

At Aurora the boys have the best of it, as the enrollment this year shows 51 boys and 46 girls. And at the Donald school the boys are in the majority, as the enrollment record for this year shows 31 boys and 30 girls.

Mill City shows the boys lead in the enrollment, as in that saw-mill town there are 38 boys and 37 girls enrolled. At Scotts Mills the boys have a larger attendance than girls, the present enrollment being 54 boys and 47 girls.

Seven more boys than girls are enrolled in the Sublimity schools. The report to the county superintendent gives 51 boys and 44 girls attending the first week of school. But at Clear Lake school is given the rather unusual record of attendance where boys are so greatly in the majority. In that school the enrollment this fall, according to the teacher's report, is 32 boys and nine girls, with a total attendance of 41.

At the Aumsville school boys are in the majority. The enrollment last week was 46 boys and 37 girls. At the Marion school girls were in the majority, as there are 35 boys and 41 girls enrolled.

Sister Mary Pullana, principal of the Mt. Angel public schools, in her report to the county superintendent, reports 59 boys and 76 girls enrolled, a total of 135.

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Damages Allowed by Supreme Court for Injuries Beneath Street Car

Florence Rostad, a Portland school girl who was injured while boarding a car of the Portland Railway, Light & Power company, wins her suit for damages, and will collect \$25,000 from the company, the supreme court having Tuesday upheld Judge Robert Tucker's court with an affirmative opinion written by Chief Justice Burnett.

Celia Rostad as guardian ad litem brought the suit against the company in behalf of the girl. The complaint demanded damages of \$100,000 and the lower court allowed \$25,000. The company appealed.

The accident happened March 30, 1920, at Twenty-ninth avenue and East Fifth street. It was alleged that as the girl attempting to board one of a train of cars the train was started with the result that she was thrown beneath the wheels. The result was that her skull was fractured and her left arm and leg were amputated by a subsequent operation. The court does not find contributory negligence on the part of the girl.

R. H. Cady vs. Bay City Land company et al, appellants; appeal from Tillamook county; suit to collect on notes. Opinion by Chief Justice Burnett. Judge George R. Bagley reversed.

Solon Schiffman, appellant, vs. Dan Hickey et al; appeal from Tillamook county; appeal from judgment for damages in action for trespass. Opinion by Justice Brown. Judge George R. Bagley affirmed.

Martin Madden vs. Columbia & Nehalem River railroad, appellant; appeal from Columbia county; action for personal injury. Opinion by Justice Bean. Judge J. A. Eakin affirmed.

Oregon-Washington Railroad & Navigation company vs. Cascade Contract company, appellant; appeal from Multnomah county; petition for rehearing denied in opinion of Chief Justice Burnett. Rehearing ordered in Shaw Wholesale company vs. Lapwal Lumber company.

Endorsement and support for the Salem Symphony orchestra

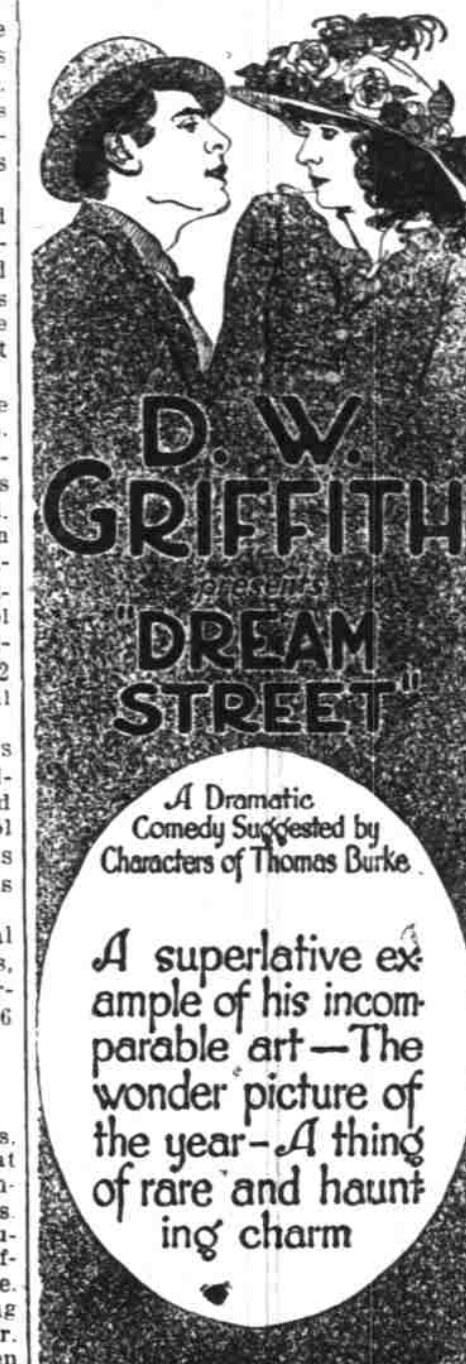
was voted at the Tuesday noon luncheon of the Salem Kiwanis club, held at the Marion hotel.

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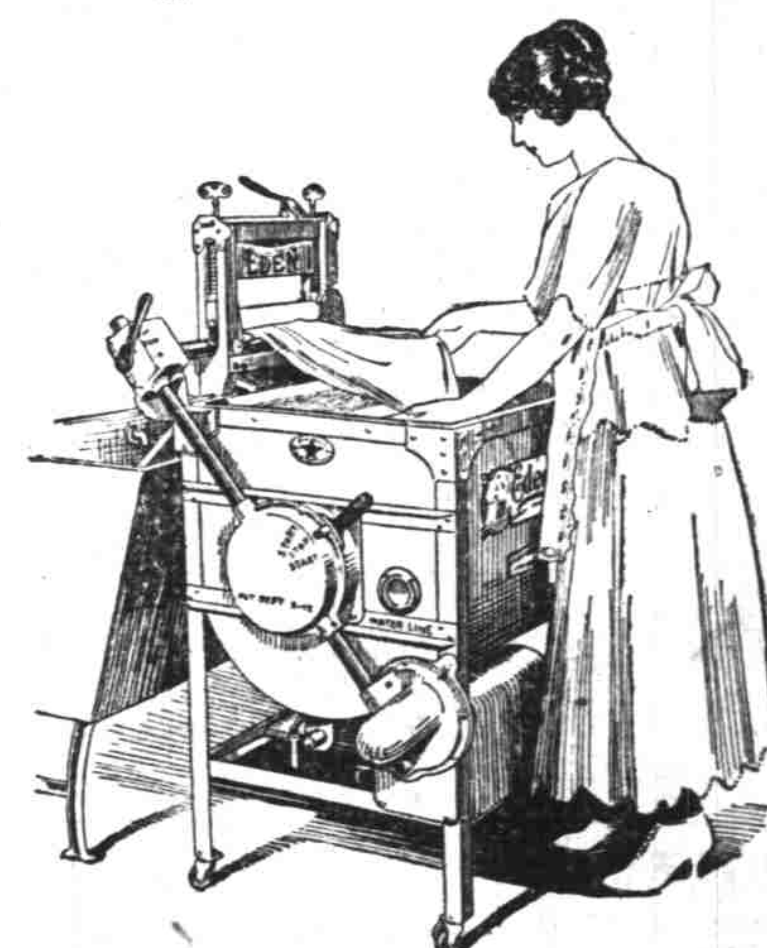
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
