

SOLDIER'S WIFE IS HERE AT LAST

Mrs. Angelo Turin Finally
Overcomes Officialdom
And Finds Husband

The wife of Angelo Turin has arrived safe and sound in Mt. Angel.

Ordinarily, the announcement of an arrival in Mt. Angel would pass by with but little notice. But in this instance the arrival of Mrs. Turin and her baby closes a chapter in which the war department, consular service, American Red Cross and several diplomatic agents took part in getting Mrs. Angelo to her husband, who is a laborer in Mt. Angel.

It was Angelo Turin, citizen of Italy who, early in April, 1917, declared his intention of becoming an American citizen and then enlisted in the American army. He was with the army of occupation at Coblenz and there fell in love with a German girl. After all sorts of official papers were signed and countersigned, they were married. And when order-

ed home Mrs. Turin and the baby were sick. Angelo returned as a soldier to America, without wife and baby.

Having so many nationalities mixed up in the deal, German authorities would not permit Mrs. Turin and baby to leave that country until there was diplomatic correspondence extending over a year and the unwinding of many yards of red tape, in which the American Red Cross did most of the untangling.

Angelo, who can speak but little English, is now a real American citizen and he had a wife and baby who are now real Americans. He was granted citizenship shortly after being discharged from the army.

TRAINING SCHOOL IS INVESTIGATED

W. L. Kuser Institution Head
from Eldora, Ia., Looks
Over Oregon Site

At the invitation of Governor Olcott, W. L. Kuser, superintendent of the Iowa state training school for boys, accompanied by Mrs. Kuser, has arrived in Salem to offer the state board of control expert advice relative to the operation of the new boys training school which is to be constructed in Salem and also to scan the site of the new institution.

When Secretary of State Sam A. Koser, Superintendent R. E. Lee Steiner of the state hospital and Architect W. C. Knighton were on a tour of inspection of boys' schools a few months ago they were highly impressed with the work of Mr. and Mrs. Kuser and commended it highly upon their return. This caused the governor to invite them to visit Oregon.

Mr. Kuser has been in boys' training school work for 22 years, first as teacher and cottage manager for two years with the Nebraska school. From there he went to Eldora, Ia., as principal of the educational department and cottage manager and after four years became assistant superintendent, which he held for two years and then became superintendent, a post he has held for four years. Mr. Kuser is a graduate of the Lincoln, Neb., normal school and of the law department of the University of Nebraska.

Mrs. Kuser has had a wide experience in institutional work. She was graduated from Wellesley college and for ten years was superintendent of the Massachusetts state industrial school for girls at Lancaster. This position she held up to two years ago.

Silverton High School
Arranges Football Games

SILVERTON, Or., Oct. 10.—(Special to The Statesman)—Under the instruction of Coach J. D. Fenenga, the Silverton high school is outlining an interesting number of football games to be played this fall. The first on the schedule came off Friday when the Silverton team met and defeated the Sedo team on the local Silver Falls field with a score of 46 to 6.

The Silverton high school is also to have an orchestra this year. The orchestra has already been organized and met for its first practice. It contains 15 pieces and will be used for high school assembly and entertainments. Harry Romig, one of the new high school instructors, is orchestra leader. The students participating receive credit toward graduation. Mr. Romig is also leader of the boys' chorus, while Mrs. Street, who had charge of the high school chorus last year has

been retained to lead the girls' chorus this year.

The high school dramatic club has been reorganized with Donald Hutton as its president. The faculty director is Mervin Hiscok, who has special training along this line at the University of California.

Mrs. Street has been engaged by the high school student body to conduct assembly singing once a week. Last year the school board paid half of the expense of engaging Mrs. Street but this year the student body voted to stand the entire expense.

An additional teacher was employed last week for the primary grades. Miss Marjorie Riches of Silverton accepted the position. Due to the congestion in the primary grades it has been found necessary to conduct the work of the first grade in half day sessions. The school board is searching for some building that could be used until the new school building is completed but so far none has been found.

More Water Applications
Filed With Department

Eleven new applications for permits to use water from Oregon streams are on file with the state engineering department, they are:

By George W. Frey, of Lake Creek, covering the appropriation of seepage and waste water for irrigation of a 10-acre tract in Jackson county.

To the Clear Lake Water Users association, Halverson, Or., covering the appropriation of water from the west fork of Clear creek and Clear Creek reservoir for irrigation and supplemental supply for 478 acres in Baker county. The estimated cost of constructing the dam and reservoir under this permit is \$2,000.

To M. F. Stoeckel, of Canyon City, covering the appropriation of water from the upper gulch, Cold creek, and other small streams for irrigation of 43 acres in Grant county.

By V. A. Reynolds, of Waldo, covering the use of water from Althouse Slough for irrigation of 20 acres in Josephine county.

By J. T. Nickerson, of Speaker, Josephine county, covering the appropriation of water from Geesh gulch, and Geesh Gulch reservoir, to be used for placer mining purposes. The cost of construction of the reservoir and distribution system amounts to approximately \$2,000.

By A. C. Wilson, of Yoncalla, covering the appropriation of water from a small spring tributary to Elk creek for use in spraying and drying fruit, in Douglas county.

By the Cedar Creek Water company, of Rex, Yamhill county, covering the appropriation of water from an unnamed spring for municipal purposes, at a cost of \$2,500.

By Mrs. Ida Kibler, of Ironside, Malheur county, covering the appropriation of water from Cottonwood creek for irrigation of 20 acres.

By Larsen & Forein, of Noti, covering the use of water from Elk creek for use in log pond and in fluming lumber, in Lane county.

By J. M. Eads of Watson, Or., covering the appropriation of water from Owyhee river for irrigation of 30 acres in Malheur county, at a cost of \$2,000.

To William H. Cripe, of Harper, covering the appropriation of water from Cottonwood creek for irrigation of 25 acres in Malheur county.

ITALIAN PRUNES UNUSUALLY BIG

Better Development Than
Usual is Noted by Orch-
ardists This Year

Seldom is it true that Italian prunes are large enough to grade as 20-30s but the usual combination of conditions during the season which has just closed has caused many of these large prunes to develop. Ordinarily there are so few that they cannot be considered on a commercial basis. This year it is different.

Individual lots of prunes, representing the output of a single grower's orchard, are in some cases running half 20-30s and in many cases there is a substantial proportion of this size. Two growers near Dallas, C. C. Camp-

bell and L. W. Plumber, delivered prunes to the Oregon Growers' association which graded 50 per cent 20-30s. An additional 35 per cent of these lots was in the 30-35 class making 85 per cent of their entire deliveries 35s or larger.

Light loads on the trees, a very favorable ripening season, and good care of the trees are responsible for the large prunes.

Some other lots that have been graded have run more than 40 per cent 20-30s and the work of grading is only well started. It is probable that more of these extra large prunes will be found and some of them may pass the high records already set.

The prunes are of unusually fine quality and contain an abundance of sugar.

Packing has started and shipments will be rushed as fast as possible in order to fill orders for prunes that have been sold since prices on the new crop were opened late in August.
