MEDFORD, Ore., Oct. 20. — Crater Lake chapter of Medford and Mount Ashland chapter of Ashland, Daughters of the American Revolution, will formally dedicate the monument or marker erected by them on the Pacific highway near the historic Culver

property south of Phoenix, tomorrow at 2:30 p. m. This monument has been erected by these groups of patriotic women of southern Oregon to commemorate the work done by the first road roads builders in this part of the state.

The dedication address will be delivered by C. E. Gates, mayor of Medford, and Mrs. Gordon McCracken of Ashland, regent of Mount Ashland chapter, and Mrs. Bert Anderson of Medford, regent of Crater Lake chapter, will unveil the monument.

Frances E. Willard day will be observed in Oregon public schools on Friday, October 28. This is in accordance with the action of the legislature.

J. A. Churchill, state superintendent of public instruction, has prepared a program for the

schools in the state. He has expressed the hope that in every schoolhouse where the school is in session the program will be presented. "Every boy or girl who learns of the mighty influence of the unselfish devotion of the late American educator and reformer to a great cause, will appreciate an opportunity to join in the observance of this day which was set apart by the state legislature," says Mr. Churchill.

The program as suggested by Mr. Churchill includes patriotic songs, addresses, readings, essays and quotations from Miss Willard by the pupils.

OREGON READY TO GIVE HELP
If Federal Money Comes Roads Will Be Built to Afford Employment

If additional federal appropriations for highway work in the state are made available by Congress immediately, Oregon will be able to expedite road work, to enhance the federal administration's unemployment program, to the full extent of money allotted to

this state plus an equal amount of state funds under the dollar-for-dollar matching arrangement. This in substance is the reply of the state highway department, on behalf of Governor Olcott, to Herbert Hoover, secretary of commerce, who telegraphed the governor yesterday to find out what Oregon could do to furnish employment in road construction. Mr. Hoover's message said that the president's unemployment conference had recommended the expediting of road construction during the present period of unemployment, and wanted to know how much road work could be started in this state if additional federal appropriations should be made available by congress within 10 days. Work begun in Oregon prior to the opening of the spring season could furnish employment for practically all kinds of road construction with the exception of the laying of pavement, which is not done during the winter season.
