Women's Activities

THE Americanization of the foreign born woman is the great problem before American women today, according to Mrs. Lee Davenport, who addressed the Republican Women's Study club yesterday.

"Within the United States there are more than 35 million people who are either foreign born themselves or the children of foreign born parents," said Mrs. Davenport. "These people represent 35 countries and speak 21 languages. Within a generation or two descendants of these people will marry our children and unless we train them they will not be capable of carrying on our government."

The Americanization program of the National Federation of Women's clubs which asks each woman who is connected with it to take for her friend, a foreign-born woman and help her to know and to love the government, was brought out by Mrs. Davenport.

"I took for my friend a foreign born woman in South Portland," said Mrs. Davenport, "and I am constantly surprised at the way she is helping me. I have been able to do very little for her though. A few days ago she called me up and wanted to know if I knew of the brides who had been arriving in Portland lately. I did not, and she explained that they were coming over to marry men who had been here long enough to get a start.

"This woman asked me if it would not be possible to form a 'bride's class' for these women and teach them the English language. She told me of seven of these brides and plans are now being made to organize just such a class. What we can accomplish for these women by going to them before they have time to get lonesome, giving them the things they want and making them feel that

we are their friends, will, I think, be of untold value."

Women will bring into the national parties a refining and uplifting influence, in the opinion of Mrs. Davenport, who has already served on the state Republican Central committee in Oregon and is a member of the Americanization committee of the Oregon State Federation of Women's clubs.

That only through party affiliation can women expect to accomplish their aims in government was shown by Mrs. Davenport. She quoted political authorities to the effect that all that had been done in the government had been done by parties, and that those who left the party because they objected to something it had done were in a class with those who "picked up their dollies and went home."

Mrs. Davenport closed her talk with a plea for the members of the club to "think, talk and pray for peace" during the next few weeks while the disarmament conference is meeting in Washington, that permanent peace and world disarmament may be a reality.
