Chance To Serve Star Route— In the mail service of the United States there are many localities to be served by mail that are not reached by railroad or regular routes. Such routes are given the name "star route." The postoffice department in Washington is advertising for bids for carrying mail on star routes, and one of the conditions are that the party who bids must live near or on the route. There is a star route from Sublimity to West Salem, and another from Monmouth to Independence. Also one from Willamina to Cloverdale, and from Grande Ronde to Otis.
