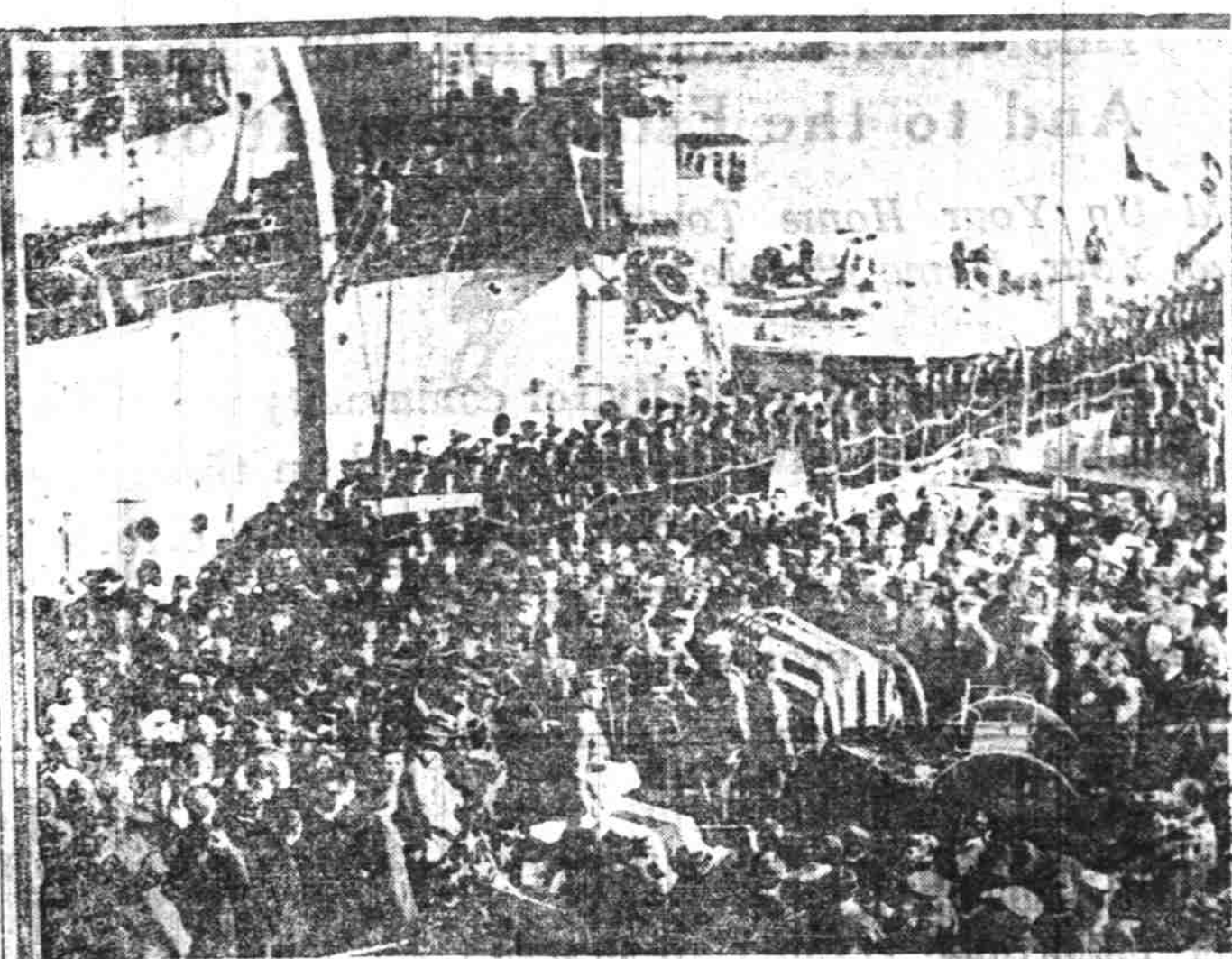

### Lane County Jury Unable To Agree in Murder Trial

EUGENE, Ore., Nov. 9.—The jury which tried Fred Thomas in circuit court here on a charge of murder in the second degree in slaying his neighbor, Wiley Hubbard at Dorena, Lane county, September 6, today reported to Judge Skipworth that it could not agree upon a verdict and was dismissed. The jury retired at 5:15 o'clock Tuesday evening and deliberated all night, reporting to the court at 10 o'clock this morning. The judge set November 25 as a date for Thomas' second trial.
